The theme of the show was centered around this being their last performance in that auditorium. They performed during a slide show that brought back past memories of former ensembles.


As always, the show was a class act. The group performed as professionals giving the audience the thrill they had anticipated.

Letters to the Editor -**Financial Aid Office Refutes Student Complaints**

Dear Editor:

This is in response to the letter concerning the Financial Aid Office in the March 28 issue. First of all, yes, the Finacial Aid Office is here to assist the students, which we do to the best of our ability and knowledge.

Second, we do not snap our fingers and have money magically appear. All financial aid, including loans, takes time to process. If student money is late in arriving, we take time to explain to the student why it is late.

Keep in mind that it is not always the fault of our office. Often, the fault lies elsewhere. In the letter, it was mentioned that a student's check was 7 months late. of the March 28 letter has questions,

We urge any student whose money is late to come to our office so we can check if there was a problem with our processing or someone else's. We work with over 1800 Financial Aid Forms and over 500 loan applications each year. Maybe this does not seem like much to some, but for the people who shuffle the mounds of paperwork, it is a very large volume of work. Mistakes sometimes happen (though not often)

Third, no single individual knows everything there is to know about loans. Federal Regulations change constantly, which changes the loan requirements. If the writer

please come to my office, and I will answer any questions I can concerning loans. However, one must ask questions. We are not mind readers.

In conclusion, the Financial Aid Office does appreciate the patience students' and understanding. There have been many students who compliment our office on how helpful we are to them. We are as helpful as we can be to all students. For those who are critical of our office, one day, maybe they will understand that things do not always go as smoothly as we would like.

After residing in other states for many years, Dr. Donald E. Herrline, Assistant Professor of Psychology, finally has the opportunity to return to his home state and teach a subject he loves.

Dr. Herrline was born and reared at Martin's Ferry, WV. He received his BS at the University of Steubenville in Ohio and obtained an MS from Florida State. Herrline completed his doctorate at the University of Tulsa. Dr. Heirline retired after

teaching several years of psychology at Northeastern University in Oklahoma. Before coming to Glenville, Dr. Herrline was the director of the Rogers Co. Guidance Clinic. He returned to teaching which "holds a greater interest" for him.

During his time at Northeastern, dedicated to his profession and students manifested itself in many ways. He was named "Faculty Member of the Year" two times during a ten-year period (1978-88) and was runner-up to this prestigious award a third time. This is quite an honor since it is voted on by the students and the 250 faculty members. The faculty of the Oklahoma Colleges and Universities awarded him the Distinguished Service award in 1982.

He was also president of the faculty senate, president of the grievance committee and was a member of the curriculum and policy committee as well as many others.

When asked what sparked his interest in psychology, Dr. Herrline responded after much deliberation: "I don't know. I've always had an interest in people and behavior."

Child psychology was cited as his favorite area of the profession. He believes having a good start in life is extremely important. "As the twig is bent so grows the tree," he commented. Human sexuality is Dr. Herrline's second favorite teaching field.

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

Dr. Herrline's job at GSC allows him to be within a three-hour drive of his childhood home. He has two brothers and a sister who reside



As the college basketball season came to an end, the Associated Press awarded its coveted Adolph Rupp Trophy for college basketball's player of the year to La Salle's Lionel Simmons. Simmons led the Explorers to a 30-2 record this season while averaging 26.5 points and 11.1 rebounds per game. Others in consideration for the award were Gary Payton of Oregon State, Derrick Coleman of Syracuse, and the late Hank Gathers of Loyola Marymount

With only two weeks remaining in the National Basketball Association's regular season, eight teams have already clinched a play-off birth. The Lakers, which are holding on to the league's best record, continue

to be challenged by Portland and Phoenix, while defending champion Detroit holds a comfortable fivegame lead over the Chicago Bulls.

In the National League, the New York Mets should continue to own the east, while the San Dicgo Padres will win the western division.
