## Computer Competency Exam Available to Ed. Students

Beginning in the fall of 1990, all teacher education students who have not had Education 101 will be required to take Computer Science 101, or will have to pass a competency exam.

The exam will be covering terminology and other elements. It will be given in room 208 Administration Building on Monday, April 9, 1990 at 3:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. Those persons passing this exam with a 80% competency

will be permitted to take part two. Those students who do not successfully pass the competency exam for Computer Science 101 will register and successfully complete, with a grade of C or better, Computer Science 101 prior to admission to teacher education. \*\*To be admitted for the written exam, one will need to register at the Computer Center in the basement of the Administration Building by April 5, 1990.

## College to Install New System for Registration

Glenville State College is in the process of instituting an entirely new computer program. The Banner System will be operating 100% by July 1, 1990. Pre-registration will be conducted on this new system during the week of April 23-27, 1990.

Please pay particular attention to the registration schedule below.

On Monday, April 23 and Tuesday, April 24, pre-registration will be conducted in the ballroom of the Pioneer Center as follows: Seniors (90+ hours), 8:00 a.m.-12:00 noon, Monday; Juniors (58-89 hours), 1:00 p.m.-3:00 p.m., Monday; Sophomores (30-57 hours), 8:00 a.m.-12:00 noon,

Tuesday; Freshmen (29 or fewer hours) 1:00 p.m.-3:00 p.m., Tuesday.

Lists will be posted around campus showing the number of hours each student has accumulated. This number is based on the hours completed at the end of the first semester (December 1989). THE REGISTRATION SCHEDULE WILL BE FOLLOWED-NO EXCEPTIONS.

Students who do not pre-register during the assigned hours may register on Wednesday, April 25 and Thursday, April 26, or Friday, April 27 at the Registrar's Office between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.



## Shakespeare Company to Perform

America's acclaimed touring repertory theatre, The National Shakespeare Company, is coming to Glenville State College to present Oliver Goldsmith's hilarious comedy "She Stoops to Conquer." The performance will be on Wednesday, April 11, 1990 at 8:00 p.m. in the Glenville State College Auditorium. There is a small fee for off-campus adults.

Goldsmith's comedy, "She Stoops to Conquer," has retained its freshness and wit, cleverness of plot manipulation, and sheer humanity for almost two hundred years. Few are the audiences that can resist the engaging rascality of Tony Lumpkin, the studied archness of Kate Hardcastle, the bumbling geniality of her parents, or the confused gallantry of her sometimes tongue-tied lover, Young Marlow.

Goldsmith, like most authors, couldn't avoid the inclusion of autobiographical material in his

work, and indeed, there are incidents and characterizations in the play which derive from events in his own life. The basic situation which provides the motivation of the play-young Marlow's mistake in assuming that the country home of the Hardcastles is an inn-is a parallel situation to one in which Goldsmith was involved in his youth. When he was sixteen years old and was returning from Edgeworthstown, Ireland, playing the gentleman with some money in his pocket and riding on a hired horse, he stopped for the night at Ardagh to ask for the best inn. A prankster like Tony Lumpkin directed him to the mansion of a Mr. Featherstone who, unlike Mr. Hardcastle, was aware of Goldsmith's identity and, being a man of humor, "went along with the gag." Like Marlow, who made a fuss about supper, Goldsmith did the same thing, going even further

in ordering special dishes for his breakfast. When he learned of the deception, again like Marlow who felt like "a silly puppy," Goldsmith was extremely upset and embarrassed.

Marlow is very much concerned with dress; he is also preoccupied with food, drink, putting on airs, and living like a "swell." Perhaps the most specific and delightful of Marlow's characteristics which derive from Goldsmith is his awkwardness in the presence of fine ladies. The tongue-tied lover is cause for many a laugh throughout the play.

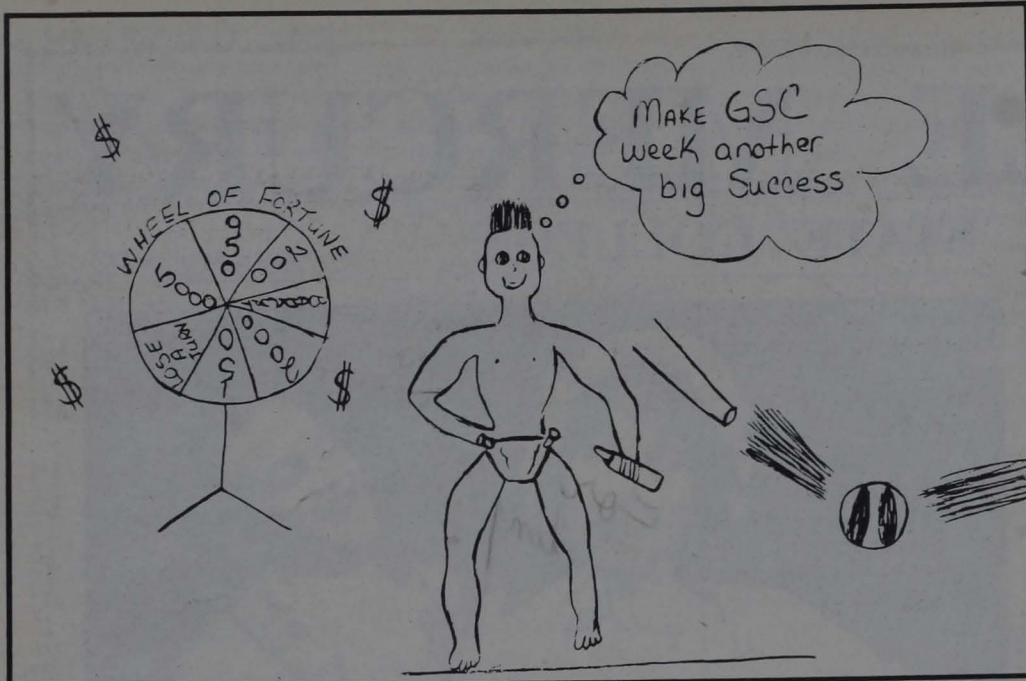

## GSC May Open as Summer Conference Center

Many colleges open up dorms and food service during the summer to organizations and government groups who use college facilities to hold conferences. These groups and organizations pay well to hold summer conferences on campus, and this money supplements both dorm and food service funds. Currently the administration is exploring the possibility of hosting conferences at Glenville State College during the summers.

Already Elderhostel, high school band camps, school attendance workshops, and other organizations use GSC facilities in the summer. Now, consideration for actively recruiting any educational or social service organizations to the campus is underway. A committee has determined that Pickens Hall has air conditioned space for 190 people, food service can feed 1000 people per meal, sufficient numbers of conference rooms around campus could serve different groups simultaneously, and conference members have plenty to entertain them here after conference hours. Summer recreation includes Cedar Creek State Park, swimming, golf, bowling, Robert F. Kidd Library, and college music, art, and dramatic activities.

Our food service and dorms could use supplemental funds from conferences. The funds would upgrade the quality of service during the school year. Also, people who attend conferences here very likely will help get word out about our college and its programs. The college custodians and food service personnel could have continuous employment throughout the summer. Possibilities for students receiving employment exist, too. Our facilities would bring in money rather than stand empty, earning nothing. Local merchants would profit from having visitors in Glenville. This idea would be beneficial to the College and the community.

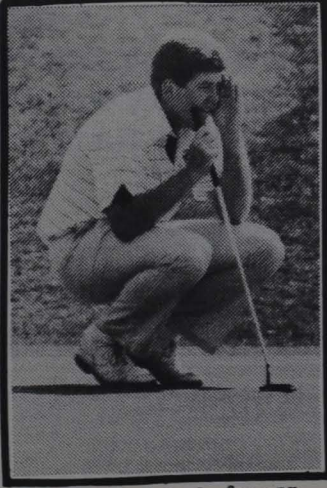
The Pioneers, who now enter into the height of their conference schedule, continue their success in what may be their best spring ever.
