

As Chairman of the Math/Science Department for 21 years, Dr. John Chisler has devoted much of his time to Glenville State College.


Dr. Chisler is a biology undergraduate of The Ohio State University. He also obtained his masters and doctorate in plant pathology at OSU.

Since he came to Glenville in 1965, Dr. Chisler has taught biology, as well as his favorites - genetics, bacteriology and cell biology. During his tenure he has "seen students become more sophisticated" yet he contends they are "less concerned about educating themselves." Students aren't responsible for laxness in education; it seems as if society in general has developed a "you-owe-me-something" attitude, Chisler believes.

As a biologist he is, naturally, concerned with the deterioration of our environment that "Earth Day" emphasized. He is in favor of cleaning up the surroundings but feels "we aren't ready to pay the price." He feels some people have already forgotten or did not heed advice given during "Earth Day" presentations. To rid the environment of waste and pollutants the consumer must be ready to give up certain things and contribute to the cause. Dr. Chisler stated, "I would like to see it happen, but we won't see it happen because I don't think any of us are willing to do what is necessary."



Lady Pioneers Win WVIAC


The Glenville State College Lady Harriers, small in number but big in heart, captured the NAIA District 28 championship Friday.

Leading the way for the Lady Pioneers was Shelley Bonnell and Tammy Taylor, both of whom set school records. Bonnell set the mark in the discus throw of (116-7) feet, while Taylor broke the 800 meters record with a time of 226.6 respectively.

For the third consecutive year, Coach Janet James was selected District 28 Coach of the Year. Coach James would like to thank all of those people who came out and helped the Lady Pioneers who competed to become District Champions.

Those Ladies who have qualified to go to Texas for national competition on May 24-26 are Lori Barker-Gardner and Dawn Farley. Barker-Gardner is ranked 14th in the nation in the 10,000 meter run with a time of 40.52.38. Farley is ranked 10th in the heptathlon with a score of 3802.

Recently, the Glenville State College Pioneer Center was renamed the Heflin Student Center.


The Glenville State College Pioneer Center was built in 1957 by Raymond Holland Corporation under the college presidency of Dr. Harry B. Heflin.

The Pioneer Center became the main place of student activity on campus. It housed the cafeteria, snack bar, game room, student meeting rooms, classrooms, GSC bookstore, student recruiting office and campus security.

Dr. Harry Heflin served as President of Glenville State College from 1947-1964. He was born in Ritchie County and obtained his B.A. from Glenville State College, his M.A. from George Peabody College and his Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Heflin's entire professional life has been devoted to education. His career began as a public school teacher in West Virginia and ended as the eighth president of West Virginia University. Dr. Heflin also currently serves on the GSC Board of Advisors.

A dedication program was held on April 28, 1990 with introductory remarks given by President William K. Simmons. Greetings were given by Chairman Espy Miller - Glenville
