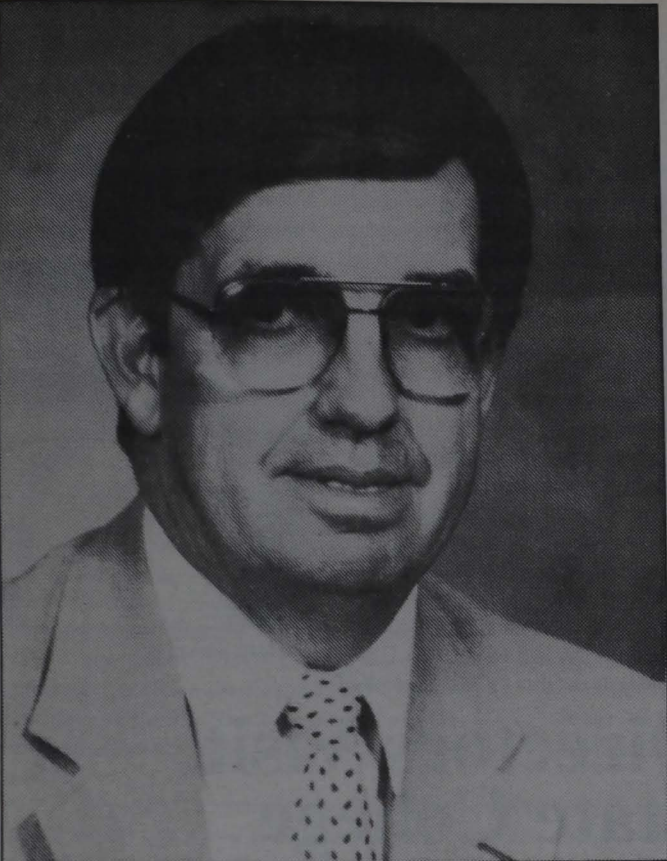

Radabaugh Chosen 1991 Alumnus of the Year

Robert Fred Radabaugh, a 1952 Graduate of Glenville State College, has been selected as 1991 Alumnus of the Year. Radabaugh has given 34 years to public education in West Virginia. He is currently a member of the Kanawha County Board of Education.

Radabaugh has an M. A. from West Virginia University, post graduate work from Marshall University, WVCOGS, and the University of Georgia. He began his teaching career at Man High School, served in the U. S. Army and went to Kanawha County in 1956 as a teacher. From 1967 to present, Radabaugh has served as vice-principal, principal, director of a Title III project, Coordinator of Testing and Evaluation, Director of Guidance and Social Services, Assistant Superintendent, Pupil Personnel Services; Assistant Superintendent, Budget/Finance, Treasurer; Assistant Manager, Kanawha County School Employees Federal Credit Union (6000

members); and currently a member of the RESA III Board and Kanawha County Board of Education.

Radabaugh is a member of many committees and organizations, including: Phi Delta Kappa, Job's Temple Association, and West Virginia School Board Association.

Tangible proof of his leadership is evident in his work in restoring and maintaining Job's temple in Gilmer County. Another example is the one-room school house that has been moved to Cedar Creek State Park.

Radabaugh is married to Willadean Clarkson Radabaugh, a 1953 graduate of GSC. The Radabaughs live in Elkview, West Virginia.

Radabaugh will be honored at the annual Alumni Banquet on April 27. Those wishing to attend should make reservations by calling the Alumni House at 462-7361, ext. 122 before April 22. Tickets are \$15.

The Glenville State College Percussion Ensemble gave everyone a similar beat Thursday and Friday night at their first concert in the Art and Music Building.

The first set pulled the audience in with Beethoven's Symphony No. 9, while the rest of the first half provided charming contemporary rhythms as well as familiar, pleasing melodies.

Typically, the percussion ensemble, master-minded by John McKinney, saved their surprises for the second set.

The first laughter from the audience came during the group's Looney Tunes melodies. McKinney's magic makers also

dazzled the audience with special visual effects.

Such touches as a Batman logo flashed on the screen during the playing of the show's theme song brought about a more relaxed atmosphere.

Perhaps the most chilling portion was the ensemble's rendition of Lee Greenwood's "God Bless the USA." The audience, who expected a full percussion version of the piece, was surprised when the performers put down their mallets and sang a verse.

Students Heather Vineyard and Tina Norman presented a duet medley of show tunes.

The group rounded up the evening with an arrangement of

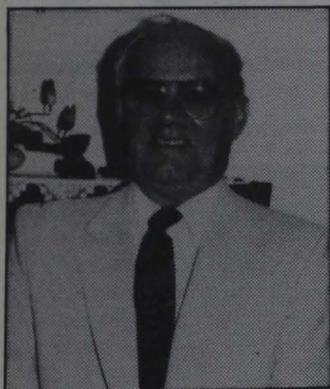
"big band" music from the 1940s. Trap set drummer Tom Chappell started off the surprises with a solo. While Chappell was busy performing the rest of the ensemble scrambled to their new positions.

The stage suddenly increased its size into a sort of "Hollywood Squares" arrangement with trap sets appearing from the darkness. Each performer had the opportunity for a solo set, with the entire ensemble collaborating for the final notes.

Director John McKinney said "I hope that you enjoyed the concert as much as we enjoyed preparing it."

work part-time in the Alumni Office; in 1986 she became the full-time manager of the office. On November 1, 1990 she accepted a promotion to director of alumni affairs.

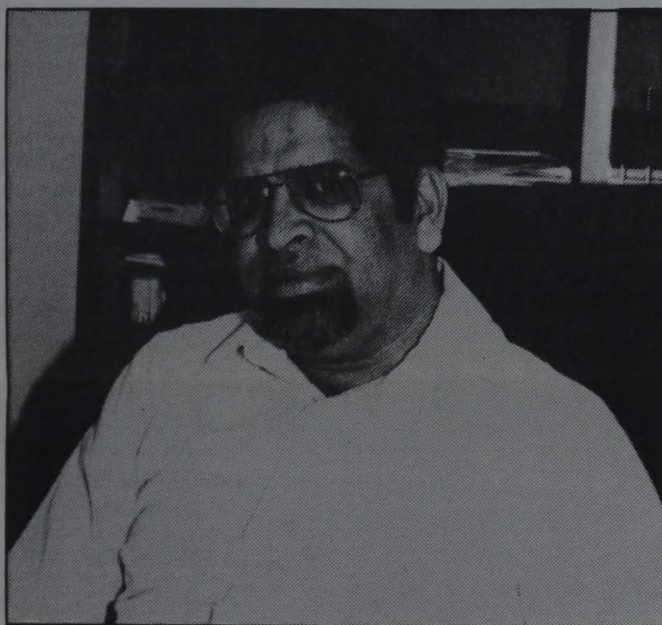

Lutchmansingh Article Published In Engineering Journal

How can maximum use be made of our oil and gas resources? How can we save computer input and storage time and space? These are questions addressed by Glenville State College's Dr. P. M. "Wally" Lutchmansingh of the Division of Land Resources, in a recently published co-authored article. A technical paper entitled, "Three-dimensional Modeling of One-eighth of Confined Five-and Nine-spot Patterns," as applied to petroleum reservoir simulation, has been published in the Journal of Petroleum Science and Engineering, Amsterdam, Netherlands.

Lutchmansingh's thesis is that valuable data can be inferred about an oil or gas reservoir by examining one-eighth of it. Then optimum operating conditions are mathematically simulated to get as much oil out of the reservoir as

possible.

Since oil and gas are depletable resources stored in porous rocks, it is necessary to withdraw as much of the resource as possible when these reservoirs are produced. This is done by injecting another fluid into one well, which displaces the oil or gas into another previously designated well. Then the resource can be drilled for and extracted.

Lutchmansingh's research has lead him to discover that evaluating the well conditions with mathematical equations on the computer, the conditions of the whole reservoir can be projected. By modeling only one-eighth of the reservoir, a vast savings in computer time and storage space can be realized. This computer tool can be used to develop new resource fields and to enhance the recovery processes of currently utilized fields.

followed by a dinner in the Ballroom of the Heflin Student Center. A performance of the renowned Glenville State College Percussion Ensemble, under the direction of John McKinney, concluded the agenda.

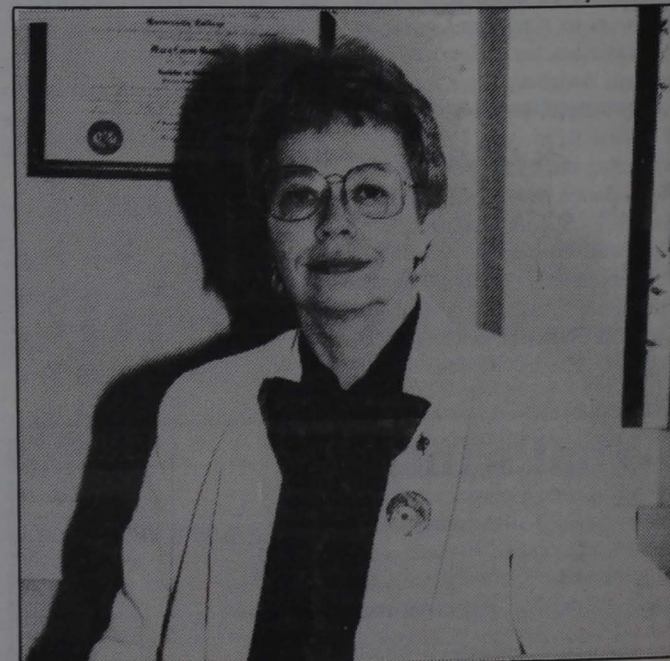
Dr. Brown's dissertation was entitled *Family Care Givers' and Their Spouses' Ways of Coping With an Elder Parent in Their Home*.

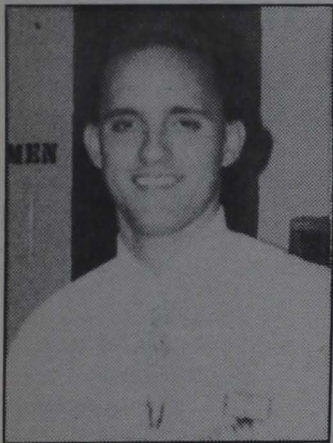

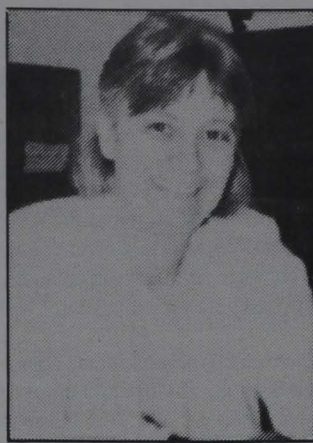

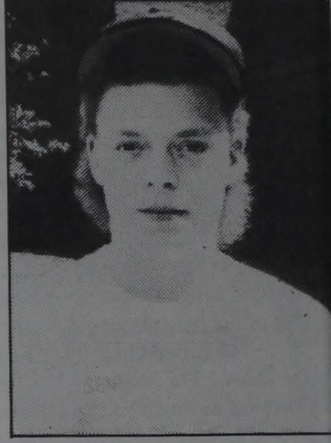

Suggestions For Summer Jobs

With less than four weeks of the spring semester left, many students are making plans for the summer vacation. One of those plans may involve a summer job. Although you may think it is too early to begin looking for a job, it is not too late to start planning.

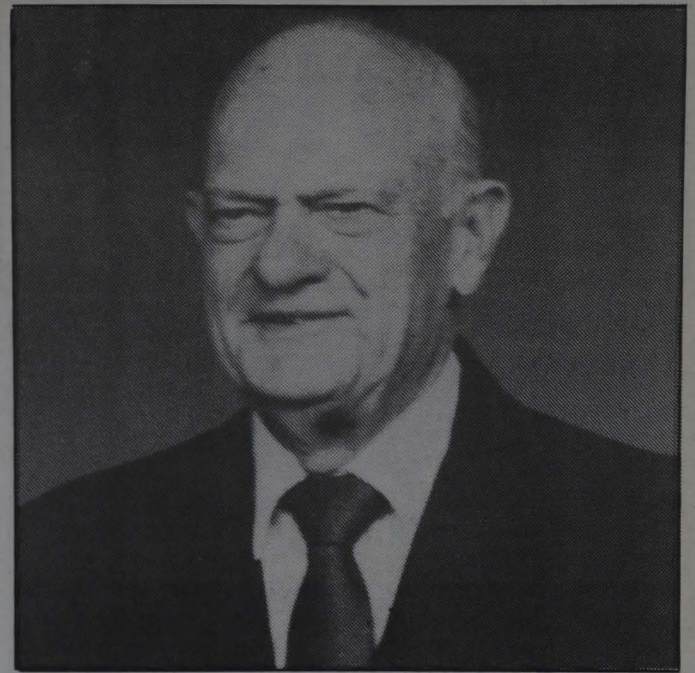
After assessing your "employable" skills by asking yourself what you do well, you will be ready to begin your job hunt. If you have trouble discovering what your strong points are, ask a professor or a friend, or someone in the career placement office to help you.

Now that you know what job skills you will be marketing, contact someone, anyone from relatives to the family doctor, who can help find job openings. The career placement office also has information on summer jobs. Other areas to research are the library, classified ads, employment agencies, public bulletin boards, and even the yellow pages.

Once you have a few job leads, you'll need to investigate the possible licensing procedures or special certification. Employers will expect you to have these things taken care of when they are ready

to hire. Now you are ready to start calling employers about job openings. Make courteous follow-up calls every few weeks or so to the employers you originally contacted.

If job openings are scant, you may want to consider starting a "mini-business." You can hire yourself out as a lawn-care specialist, an errand-runner, and much more. Simply draw up and photocopy flyers. Post them in grocery stores, laundromats, banks, or even car windshields in parking lots. You can also put an ad in the classified section of a local newspaper.

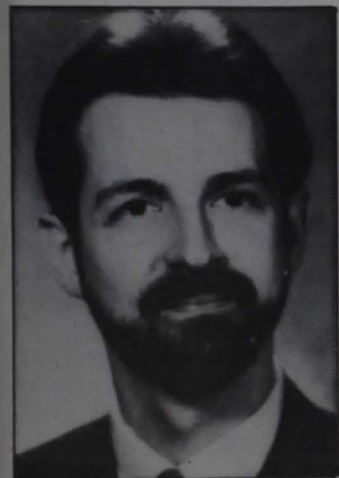

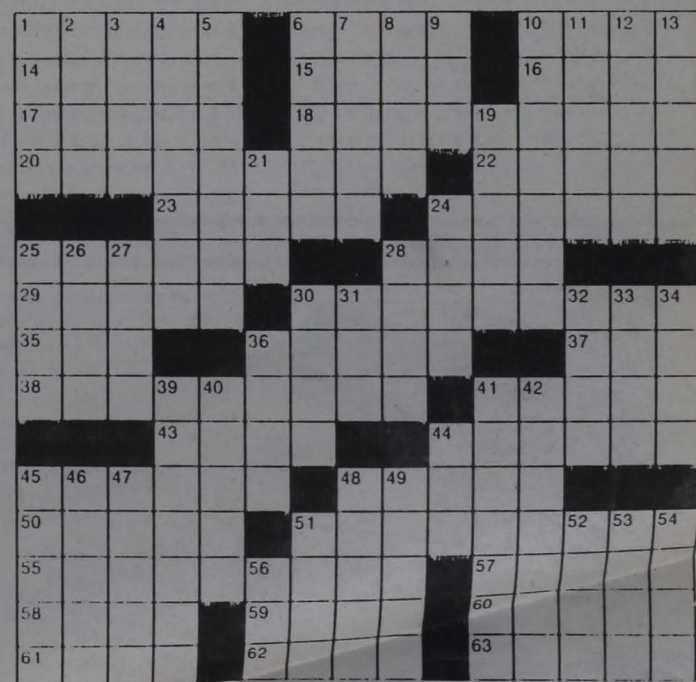

Gun Control Proposal

Brady Brought Before House

In 1989, almost 19,000 people were murdered in the United States. In more than 60 percent of those homocides, the murder weapon was a gun.

Between 1979 and 1989 alone, the Justice Department reports in a survey of victims of handgun crimes, offenders used their weapons to kill an average of 9,200 Americans each year and to assault 15,000 of their victims.

According to Handgun Control, Inc., 1,200 people die each year from handgun accidents and handguns were used by 12,701 Americans to take their own lives in 1987.

The typical handgun crime involved a single offender armed with no other weapon confronting

a stranger on a street. Eighty-seven percent of the offenders did not fire their weapons but used them to threaten their victims. Most victims were assaulted, 30 percent were robbed, and one in 50 were raped.

However, according to a recent article in the *Charleston Gazette*, lawmakers and lobbyists for gun control have at last agreed this could be the year for legislators to pass a bill to restrict the sale of handguns.

The bill, dubbed the Brady Bill, came before the House Judiciary on April 10. If the proposed bill passes, a requirement of a seven day waiting period would take effect. During those seven days a check would be made concerning police and prison records

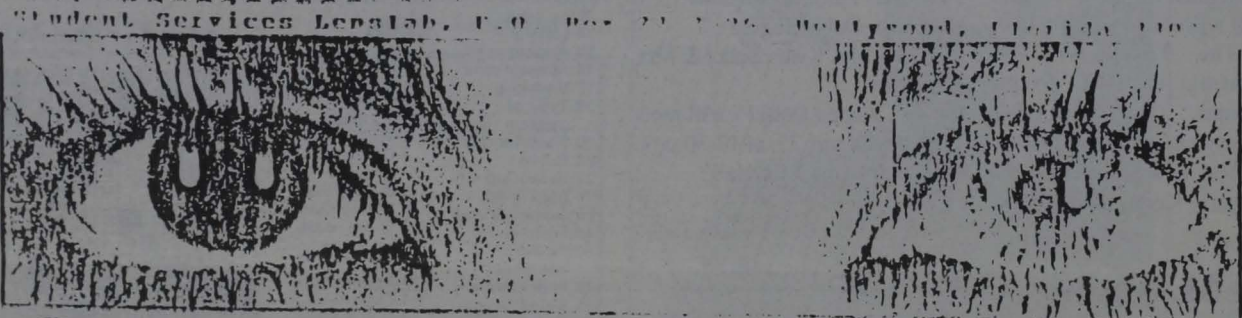
so no guns would be sold to felons or fugitives.

The question I propose is do you think the legislature should restrict the sale of hand guns? Or, does anyone have the right to walk in and purchase a handgun without his or her past being dissected? Remember, it's a matter of life or death.

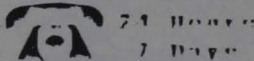


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
