

Lloyd Elliot Chosen Commencement Speaker

President Emeritus of the George Washington University and President of the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, Dr. Lloyd H. Elliott, will address the 117th graduating class at Glenville State College at 11 a.m. on Saturday, May 11, 1991. Elliott, a graduate of Glenville State College, will be addressing a graduating class of 377 students, the largest in the history of the college.

Elliott received a B.A. from Glenville State College, an M.A. from West Virginia University, and an Ed.D. from the University of Colorado. He is a member of many professional organizations and has published more than 35 articles and papers in the field of education. He has devoted many years to the field of education as both an educator and an administrator.

As part of the graduation ceremony on May 11, Elliott will be honored as a Distinguished Pioneer. The award is made on the level of honorary degrees to individuals who have distinguished themselves by loyal support to higher education; and, who have

contributed to its progress and quality far beyond ordinary levels.

Dr. William K. Simmons, president of Glenville State College, said, "I am proud of Dr. Elliott as a West Virginian and a graduate of Glenville State College. He has established himself nationally as an educator and the accomplishments he had made in education are a real tribute to the college and to Dr. Elliott. The college, in recognizing his accomplishments and contributions to higher education in this country, is proud to bestow upon him, its highest award--Distinguished Pioneer."

Concerning his upcoming address, Elliott said, "I am honored and pleased to be coming back to Glenville State College where I began as a freshman in 1933. My wife and I look forward to returning."

Elliott, son of John and Belva (Stone) Elliott, was born in Clay County, West Virginia. He is married to Evelyn Elder Elliott. They have two children: Lloyd Gene and Patricia Ann. Dr. Elliott and his wife reside in Washington, D.C.

Student Recipients Named For Alumni Foundation Awards

The Glenville State College Alumni Foundation Awards are made each year on the recommendations of faculty members on various proficiencies. Recipients of the awards are honored as outstanding students in their particular field of study. Funds for the awards have been provided by alumni, faculty, and friends of Glenville State College and are managed by the Alumni Foundation. The 1991 Foundation Awards were given on Saturday, April 27, at 1:30 in the Art & Music Building Auditorium.

The Peterson Library Award, named for Mrs. Dorothy Peterson who was assistant librarian at Glenville State College at the time of her death in 1962, honors a student who shows excellence in the field of library science. The recipient, Nancy Diann Wayne of Valley Fork, West Virginia, has a teaching degree and is seeking an additional endorsement in library science. Wayne is a volunteer at the Wesley Foundation, a member

of the Glenville Earth Society, and was a member of *The Glenville Mercury* staff for one semester. Wayne plans to attend graduate school in the fall of 1991 pursuing a master's in library science. Wayne is married to David A. Wayne, the Guidance Counselor at Clay County High School.

The Toth Science and Math Award, established in memory of Frank L. Toth, Associate Professor of Physics at the time of his death in 1970, is presented to a student who exhibits outstanding skills in science and mathematics.

The recipient, Janet K. Sears of Stumptown, West Virginia, is a senior education major with specializations in math and general science, grades 5-12. Sears is a member of Chi Beta Phi, Kappa Delta Pi, Intramurals, and Pickens Hall Governing Board. She is the daughter of Delbert and Jean Sears of Stumptown.

The Davis Education Award, established in November 1988 in memory of Avonell "Tish"

Singleton Davis at the time of her death, is granted to an education major who has completed or is currently in the student teaching program. The award was established to honor Mrs. Davis' commitment to public education by helping future teachers.

The recipient of the Davis Education Award is Christine L. Jamison.

The Turner Science and Math Award was established in the name of Dr. Byron Turner who served as professor of chemistry from 1946 to 1976 when he retired. The award was established at the time of his death in 1978 to recognize scholarship in science and math.

The recipient, Michael Linn Schimmel, Jr. of Glenville, West Virginia, is a graduating senior chemistry major with minors in mathematics and physics. Schimmel is the president of the American Chemical Society. He is the son of Michael and Marie Schimmel

Osborne Retiring After 25 Years

William J. Osborne is retiring July 31, 1991, as Business Manager of Glenville State College after 25 years of service.

During his tenure the state appropriations budget for GSC, which Osborne has managed, has grown from almost a million dollars in 1966 to 5.5 million in 1991. The number of GSC staff positions has increased from 107 to 177 during the same years.

Osborne has been responsible for the finances of many physical plant changes at GSC during his employment. The changes include the furnishing of Louis Bennett Hall, the renovation

of Clark Hall, the construction of Robert F. Kidd Library, Eberle Hall, Pioneer Stadium, the two top floors of Pickens Hall with Scott wing addition, and the Fine Arts Building.

Osborne has been active in Trinity United Methodist Church, the Glenville Lion's Club, and has been a charter member and treasurer of the Board of Directors of the Gilmer County Medical Center, Inc.

"I have felt (GSC) a friendly campus for all the years," Osborne said. "I have enjoyed meeting the students...."

Osborne said he plans to remain in Glenville after retirement, and to travel. He said, "It was a

hard decision to retire," but he "look(s) forward to coming back on a regular basis to see what's going on."

Osborne's son, Kenneth, is a GSC graduate who is an Instructor in the physical education department. Osborne's wife, Janet, retired as secretary to the Pioneer Center Director in January, 1990.

Osborne said his hope for GSC's future is for the State of West Virginia to put more money into meeting the needs of the institution. "We've put a limit on taxing our students. More taxes may drive (potential) students away," he said.

Parking Restriction Added to Clark Hall

The Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Faculty Administrative Organization passed a motion to place a no overnight parking restriction in the Clark Hall Parking Lot beginning the fall semester 1991.

This simply means that

Louis Bennett Hall Residents will be required to park their automobiles in the High Street Parking Lot located below the Administration Building, or at any other non-restricted lots. Currently, there are three (3) parking lots where an automobile cannot be parked after 1:00 a.m. (overnight parking). These restricted lots are:

- 1-The Administration Building Lot
- 2-The Library Lot
- 3-The Clark Hall Lot.

Automobiles parked in these restricted lots will be ticketed by campus police after 1:00 a.m.

So, keep this in mind (especially L.B.H. Residents) when

college opens in the fall.

Both students and faculty/staff may park in any lot on campus with the exception for students in the one lot next to the Administration Building. Of course, a current \$10.00 parking permit is required.

Fall is a congested time for parking, so remember to give yourself a few extra minutes lead time to find parking. Also, remember that the college has leased the space beyond the back of Pickens Hall Between Johnson and Howard Streets for extra parking space. Beyond this, "car pooling" has saved both space and money.

1990-91 Was a Big Year For 'Our Little School'

Alumnus of the Week: John McKinney

"It has been a terrific year for Glenville State College," said William K. Simmons. The year which began with the fall enrollment at an all time high of 2,238 students has been an extraordinary year of highlights.

The new Art and Music Building celebrated its opening with dedication week: A wide range of festivities included a performance by the West Virginia Symphony and special guest Wendy Chen, and the play "Our Town." The fine arts department didn't stop there. The West Virginia Collegiate Music Educators Association held its 1990 fall conference at GSC. Additionally, the GSC Continuing Education Program developed the Community Chorus which shared its first performance, Handel's *Messiah*, with the GSC Concert Choir and the Lilliput Orchestra. And the entertainment continued with various art shows, plays, and musical performances.

Homecoming brought the dedication of the Luanna Thompson Smith Amphitheater. The late Mrs. Smith served as Administrative Assistant to the president of GSC for 11 years and Assistant to the President for another six.

Four programs were chosen as 'peaks of excellence' at GSC: Business Administration, Forest Technology, Elementary/Early Childhood Education, and Secondary Education-Certification in Music Education. Special efforts

will be made to obtain funding for these programs from private, federal, and state resources.

An associate degree program in criminal justice has been approved and introduced into the GSC curriculum. Additionally a behavioral science program has been approved within the social science division.

Several of the year's highlights were organized by the Alumni Center. Alumnus of the year was 1952 GSC graduate Robert Fred Radabaugh of Elkview, who has given West Virginia public education 34 years of his life; the Alumni Center Parlor/Dining Room was dedicated to James W. Curry of Hagerstown, MD, who paid the remainder of the Center's purchase price; and the GSC Alumni Service Award was given to C. Jack Luzader and Thelma Wilson Samples. Luzader devoted many years to the Alumni Foundation and Samples is currently the Director of the Alumni Association at GSC.

To close the year, GSC will begin the drilling of its third gas well in the Verona Maple parking lot on the Monday after commencement. The drilling of the well will provide natural resources which will, in turn, support higher education.

"I'm really proud of our little school," Simmons said, "It's just been a year of tremendous highlights."

"I always wanted to be a band director," McKinney said. "The percussion ensemble came along after that, but now I enjoy doing them both equally as well," McKinney admitted.

After his student days at GSC, McKinney landed a job as band director at Calhoun County High School.

McKinney decided to go on to graduate school after seven

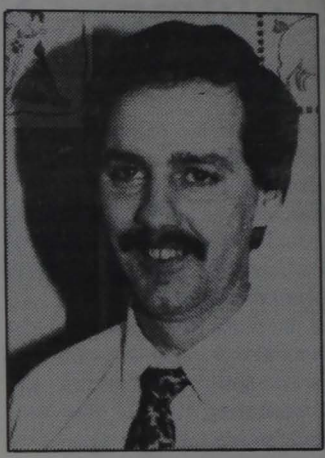
years at Calhoun. At West Virginia University, McKinney was assistant marching percussion instructor for the WVU marching band.

Upon completing his masters degree, McKinney went back to Calhoun for one more year but taught part-time at GSC. It was that year, 1980, that McKinney started the GSC percussion ensemble.

In 1982, McKinney was hired full-time at GSC as band director and percussion instructor.

McKinney said what he likes about Glenville is the "small college atmosphere, students, fellow faculty members and the (music) facility."

McKinney said he "was real pleased that the music

department at GSC was the only department in the state that was selected as a 'Peak of Excellence' for higher education."

In The Market Place...

Graduates with master's degrees in health administration are in great demand and graduates find jobs in their field quickly, a survey administered by Korn/Ferry International and the Association of University Programs in Health Administration (AUPHA) finds. The average health administration graduate with an MHA, MBA, or other master's-level degree found employment in 3.8 months, 73 percent reporting that the position they accepted was their first choice. Six months after graduation, 90 percent of the graduates reported having obtained employment. The average salary was \$35,833 for master's graduates, who are typically around 31 years old and have 4.9 years of prior work experience in a health-related setting.

Students typically take two to three years to earn a master's degree in health administration. Programs are located in schools of business, medicine, public health, and public administration and award degrees such as MBA, MPH, MHA, and MPA. Some programs prefer students to have prior work

experience in the health field, while others do not. Health administration graduates work in settings such as hospitals, health maintenance organizations (HMOs), health care consulting firms, insurance companies, long-term care facilities, and government agencies. They may have operating responsibilities in general agencies. They may have operating responsibilities in general administration, financial analysis, information systems, health promotion, management of cost containment programs, and other planning functions.

Health administration is an increasingly popular field for women (59.4 percent of the survey respondents receiving graduate degrees were women, up from 40 percent in 1979). Of those receiving undergraduate degrees, 72.1 percent were women. Increasing numbers of women are expected to be represented among hospitals' senior executive leadership in the future. "Women should take note, health care is a very receptive industry for aspiring women executives," said James N. Heuerman, Managing Vice

President of Korn/Ferry International's Health Care Division in San Francisco.

AUPHA President Gary Filerman, Ph.D., said, "The survey proves what health administrators know - health administration is a good career field. The work is demanding, but it is also rewarding and consequential. Administrators make a vital contribution to the quality of health care and well-trained people are a necessity."

Surveys were mailed to 1988 graduates of AUPHA member programs in the U.S. that offer degrees in health administration. The surveys were sent out six months after graduation to allow students time to find employment. Of 1,043 master's-level graduates surveyed, there were 818 respondents, for a response rate of 78.4 percent; of the 505 baccalaureate graduates surveyed, there were 312 respondents, for a response rate of 61.8 percent. The graduate classes have been surveyed in 1979, 1981, 1983, 1985 and 1988. The undergraduate classes were surveyed in 1985 and 1988.

Korn/Ferry International is an executive search firm with a specialty health care division and works with AUPHA to provide a clear and ongoing picture of the entry-level job market in health administration. Located in Arlington, Virginia, AUPHA is a consortium of bachelor's and master's programs in health administration organized to improve health services through education for health management. General Schwarzkopf Returns to United States

Norman Schwarzkopf and much of his staff flew from Riyadh, Saudi Arabia Friday declaring "We completed our mission."

Schwarzkopf ended 257 days of command operations and officially brought to an end the U.S. combat role in the Persian Gulf. Fewer than 260,000 American

servicemen and women remain from a peak of 540,000 during the Gulf war.

Schwarzkopf will continue to command U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf from Central Command's normal headquarters in Tampa, Florida.

In his farewell speech, he expressed sympathy for the more

than 40,000 refugees in southern Iraq and the estimated 2.3 million Kurds fled their homes in northern Iraq after their uprising against Hussein's government failed.

Schwarzkopf said American troops would remain in a newly established U.N. demilitarized zone to protect "every single refugee in the southern part

of Iraq" until the United States is assured they will be safe from reprisals by Saddam.

About 18,000 U.S. soldiers are guarding the refugees in the narrow buffer zone along the Kuwait-Iraq border.

Schwarzkopf urged the public not to link a controversial decision by President Bush to halt a devastating U.S. ground assault against Iraq's army to Saddam's crushing of the Kurdish and Shiite Muslim rebellions that followed.

Schwarzkopf said there was no question the Kurds "probably saw an opportunity to take advantage

of a major defeat of the Iraqis to continue their rebellion."

"But to somehow imply that because we did not continue for one more day of the attack that the rebellion did not succeed is bogus."

He gave no hint about what he plans to do when he retires this summer after 35 years in the Army, but he knocked down speculation he would run for a U.S. Senate seat from Florida next year. Asked if he had plans for a career in politics, he replied: "None."

"I'm going to go home. That's what is next for me," he said.

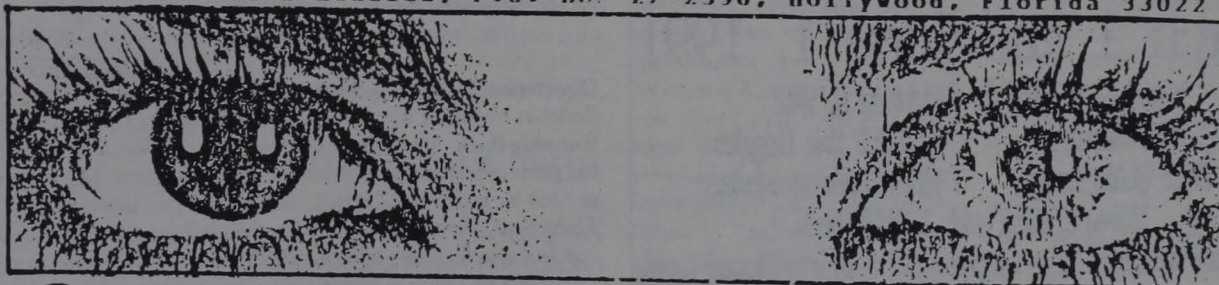
