## Former Pioneer Coach Named 1991 Homecoming Parade Marshal

The Glenville State College Homecoming Parade will be held at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, October 26 on Main Street in Glenville. This year's Parade Marshal is Alvon F. "Nate" Rohrbough, a 20 year coach at GSC during the years 1926 to 1946.

A reception in honor of Rohrbough will be held Friday, October 25 at 7:00 p.m. in the End Zone Room at Pioneer Stadium. All former athletes, managers and friends are invited to attend.

Rohrbough received his BA and master's degree from West Virginia University. He retired as Lieutenant Commander from the U.S. Navy. For 20 years he coached football, basketball and baseball with no assistant and taught fifteen hours a week at GSC. He was also

athletic director and bus driver. After his 20 years at Glenville, Rohrbough was Administrative Assistant to the Chief of Staff at the Veteran's Hospital in Hampton, Virginia where he retired after 30 years.

Rohrbough and his wife Phyllis, a 1933 graduate of GSC, live in Poquoson, Virginia. They have two sons, John and William, both graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy and both served in the Navy until their retirement. John attended GSC for two years before going to the USNA. The Rohrboughs have four grandchildren.

## GSC Named Center for Math and Science Research

The Science and Math Division of Glenville State College has been awarded a \$146,164 grant by the U.S. Department of Education to serve as a Region III Math and Science Center. This center will provide opportunities to forty Upward Bound secondary-school students from Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia to engage in academically challenging science and math studies during the summer of 1992.

The grant resulted from the collaboration of Glenville State College with the National Radio Astronomy Observatory, Green Bank, WV; the Wildlife Division and the Waste Management Section of the Department of Natural Resources, Charleston, WV; the Mathematics Department of West Virginia University, Morgantown, WV and E. I. DuPont de Nemours and Company, Washington, WV. Glenville State College personnel involved in the conceptualization and development of the project were Ralph Bame, Arlene Briski, Dr. John Chisler, Dr. Joe Evans, Dr. Sharon Kraus, James Meads, Paul Peck, Dr. Mary Jo Pribble, and Dr. Duke Talbott.

Applications will be accepted from students throughout Region III and participants will be selected in accordance with the eligibility requirements established by the U.S. Department of Education. The forty successful applicants will study science and math topics on the Glenville State College campus from June 21 - July 31, 1992. Topics to be covered are: radio astronomy, field biology, polymer and nuclear chemistry, environmental studies, and applied mathematics. Science and math

instruction will be provided by GSC staff members, Bame, Evans, Meads, Peck and Pribble with support from research scientists supplied by the agencies who collaborated in the development of the project. On site visits will be hosted by each of the cooperating agencies and extended field trips will be conducted to scientific facilities in Tennessee and Pennsylvania. Each of the participants will conceptualize an independent research project during the six week period which they will conduct during 1992-93 academic year.

When Evans, project director, was asked why this project was important, he responded, "There is a critical need in the United States for our public school students to pursue science and math careers. If this national program, of which we are a part, is successful, there will be an increase in the number of United States students choosing such vocations." He continued, "This program is specifically designed to encourage students from groups that are currently under-

Rather, I speak of those friendships that persevere throughout the years, even when it is no longer convenient to get together. Sometimes significant periods of time go by, between our visits to one another; but that is alright, because we've learned that THIS friendship is going to persevere, no matter what.

name is Rick. Our friendship goes back to college days at WVU, about 18 years ago. He used to save seats for several of our group at Mountaineer football games, and we had some really good times together. We attended the greatest football game I ever hope to see in 1975- WVU's last second victory over the hated Panthers of Pittsburgh, 17-14. When my son was born prematurely in 1981, Rick prayed for him. When his father died in 1985, I prayed for him. When he was married about three years ago, he asked me to offer one of the readings during the service. In January of 1990, I helped him move to Asheville, NC. But our friendship is in no jeopardy; he is available if I should need him, and I hope he knows that I am always willing to help him if he has a need. We've never really put that sort of stuff into words, since, like most men, we find such matters almost impossible to mention; but it's there, anyway, and he knows it,

and I know it, and it is such friendships, given as yet another manifestation of the beauty and grace of God, that make our journeys through life more pleasant, and give our lives a deeper dimension of fulfillment, as well.

By the way, Rick was married at St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church on National Road in Wheeling, and my wife and I were probably the only Protestants in the sanctuary that day. But it certainly did not prevent Rick from asking me to share a reading with the congregation; nor did it prevent me from joyful participation. Somehow, we thought God could take it all in stride; we are, indeed, children of the same Heavenly Father, aren't we?

If I hadn't shared with you the fact that we are from different Christian families, you never would have suspected it, would you?

That's a point well taken...

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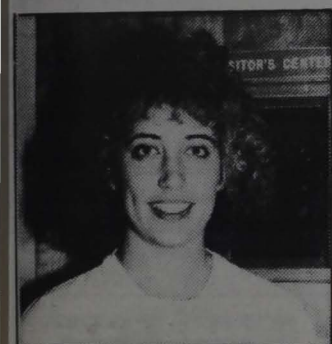
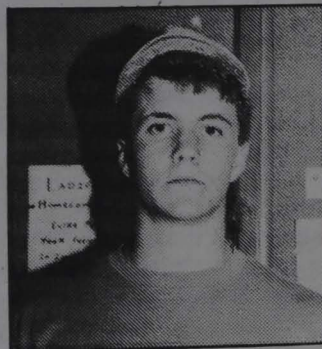

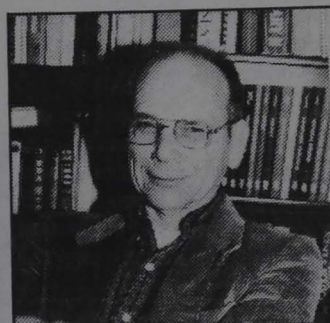

The student teachers are presently completing their final semester at GSC with on the job training from area schools. The reception was designed to allow students an informal environment to discuss, among themselves, the happenings in their classrooms.

Recruiters were also welcome to come meet the students on a casual basis, before the formal interviews scheduled for Friday, October 11, between 9:00 and 3:00

The general consensus of the students was one of great appreciation toward the GSC Education Department. "It's been a great experience and I'm glad I chose this profession. Glenville definitely prepares you with a good education," said Greg Alfred, who is presently teaching at St. Mary's Elementary.

Director of Career Planning and Placement, Jennifer Nottingham, explained that the student teachers will graduate in December but will have the option to go through the formal ceremony in May.

The students' respective

schools are presently evaluating and rating their progress toward a pass or fail grade for the semester.

## Sypolt Speaks to International Group on Mining Courses and Laws

Mr. Charles R. Sypolt gave a talk to the VIII Congress, International Society for Mine Surveying, and the XII Annual National Symposium on Mining on September 24, at Lexington Kentucky. The talk entitled "Essentials of a Successful Mine Surveying Course" was simultaneously translated into Russian and German. He also gave a talk on "The Underground Surveyor's License Law in West Virginia."

This is the first year that the International Society has met in the United States. There were many representatives from the United Kingdom, eastern Europe, USSR, India, China, Japan, and Australia. The joint conference gave participants an opportunity to learn mine surveying techniques, methods, and equipment from around the world. Mr. Sypolt is an Associate Professor in the Land Resources Division and has taught mine surveying for seventeen years.

## GSC and County Schools Form Alliance to Improve Academics

An alliance is being formed between the English/language-arts faculty of Glenville State College, Lewis, Gilmer, Calhoun, and Braxton County Schools.

The alliance, which is the newest of more than 500 academic alliances documented by the American Association for Higher Education, is designed to promote a smoother transition of students

from school to college, improve curriculum and teaching, and increase public awareness of the importance of the discipline to the community.

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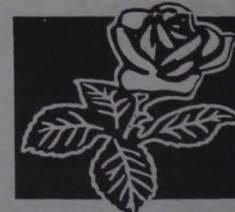

## Film Deals with Fantasy and Reality of the Homeless

The latest film starring Robin Williams, entitled "The Fisher King", can best be described as inspirational. The film deals with a subject that most people would prefer to ignore--the homeless. Robin Williams plays Perry, a once successful college professor who, due to a tragedy in his life, has become a mentally disturbed homeless man. Jeff Bridges plays an insulting radio talk show host named Jack Lucas. Jack gets a call from a man wanting advice about how to get the attention of a woman he likes. The caller misinterprets Jack's advice and goes to a popular Yuppie nightclub and begins firing

a shotgun at the patrons, killing several of them. Jack is consumed by guilt, and lets his life fall apart. Desperate, he tries to commit suicide by jumping off a dock. Luckily, Perry and his group of homeless friends (who think they are Medieval Knights) show up and stop him. They take him back to their "home" where he spends the night. Jack later finds out the reason for Perry's mental disturbance. His wife had been murdered in the bar by the caller Jack gave advice to. Jack believes that if he can help Perry that his own life will get better. Perry's quest is for what he believes to be the Holy Grail and he thinks

that Jack has been sent to help with his mission.

Both men wrestle with their consciences and the guilt that each feels for the death of Perry's wife. Perry's conscience materializes as the fierce Red Knight who is trying to destroy him. The image of the Red Knight chasing Perry through Central Park, with flames bursting forth from his helmet, is more than memorable, it's truly frightening. Director Terry Gilliam did an excellent job of showing how terrifying it is for Perry to accept the death of his wife. To escape facing the reality of it, Perry created a Medieval world

in which to live, with New York City as the stage for his fantasy.

This movie is not all gloom and doom, because with Robin Williams you know there are laughs, a lot of them. However, they never down play the seriousness of this film, rather they give it a lighthearted feel that releases the audience from the guilt they will undoubtedly feel for the way they have viewed the homeless, not as human beings but just faces in a crowd. We see that they are different in only one way, they don't have homes. But they do have feelings and pasts that weren't always as bleak as their present circumstances.

This film is a rarity, in that you begin to care about all of the characters, and there are no bad performances. Amanda Plummer plays a nerdy woman working for a publishing company who Perry falls in love with. Mercedes Raulo plays Jack's often times ignored girlfriend. I won't give away anymore of the film, because there are many surprises. If you want to see a movie that will make you laugh and cry and lift your spirits, as well as stimulate your own conscience, then I strongly suggest that you see "The Fisher King."

Hitchcock's later films had line or image themes. "Psycho" had horizontal and vertical lines bisecting each other and "North by North-West" used the diagonal line. It is amazing to watch these films and count how many times the line image is used.

Lastly, for the keen Hitchcock film watcher, he puts in a cameo appearance of himself somewhere in each of his films.

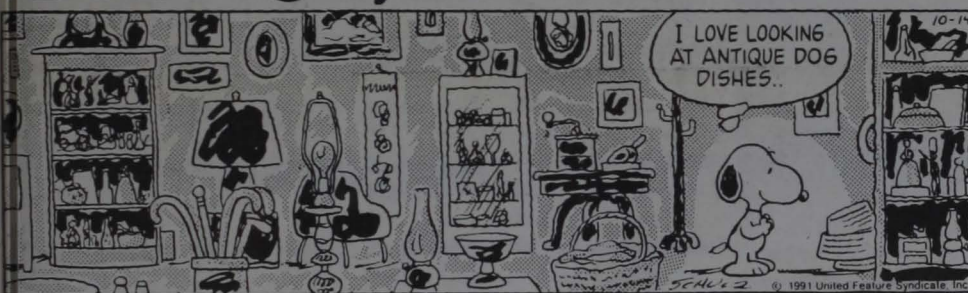

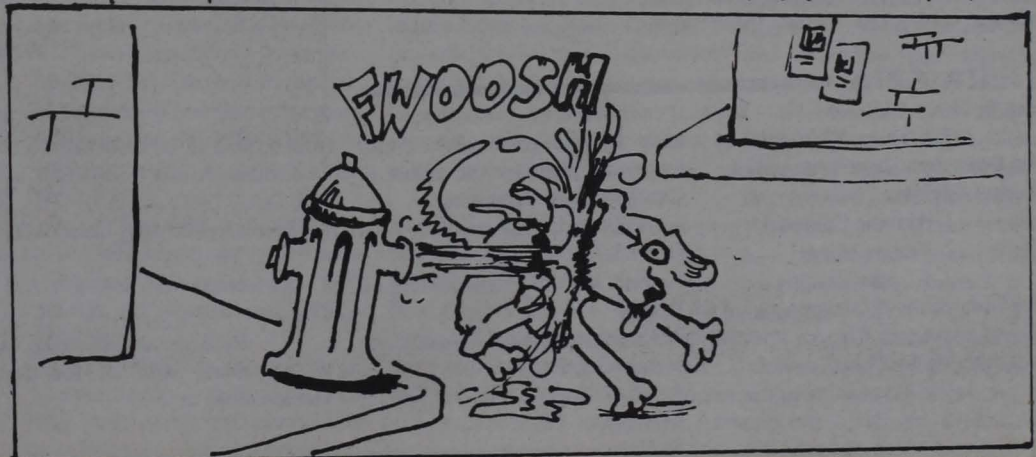

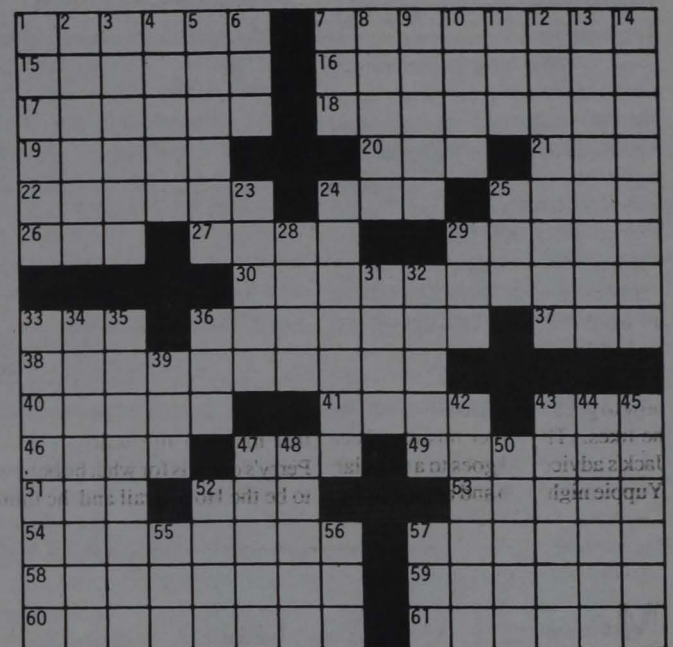

# Snowshoe Mountain Resort Upgrades Facilities and Grounds

It was a busy summer for construction and renovation projects at Snowshoe Mountain Resort. The Pocahontas County Resort's Board of Directors authorized nearly four (4) million dollars to be spent on Capital Improvements and New Development.

"We have been virtually working from 'top to bottom' since the end of last ski season," said Danny Seme, Snowshoe's President and General Manager. "Besides major construction of a golf course and tennis complex at the base of the mountain, we are finishing up an extensive building renovation and landscaping project at the top of the mountain."

In its effort to develop as a four-season destination resort, Snowshoe is well underway with the construction of their new 18-hole Championship Gary Player Signature Golf course. Completion is scheduled for July 1993. The course will also feature a host of other amenities such as a clubhouse, seven Har-Tru tennis courts (which were completed this past June), pool, condominium village and an extensive selection of real estate offerings.

The improvements at the top of the mountain include both interior and exterior building renovations. Skiers will now be

able to purchase lift tickets and equipment rentals at the Top of the World Complex. The resort's child care center has been moved from Mountain Lodge to the newly renovated Edelweiss Building, which is located slopeside, providing easier access for skiing parents. Shavers Centre, Timberline Lodge, and Skidder Restaurant all have received exterior face-lifts this summer, while an extensive pedestrian walkway designed with concrete pavers now connects all buildings from Timberline to Shavers Centre. Already able to produce the most snow in the Southeast, Snowshoe has again

added to its vast snowmaking system. With these improvements, which include additional snowmaking equipment and water pumps, Snowshoe will now be able to make over 1,000 tons of snow per hour, weather permitting. All of Snowshoe's seven triple lifts were upgraded with new electronics. "We've always been proud of our snowmaking abilities and this is an area that we've strived to be superior in the market place. Without the ability to produce a superior product quickly, efficiently and in mass quantity, we would not be the best in the region," said Seme.

Snowshoe's capitol

improvement projects have also meant a boost to the local economy. The contractors on site have hired a large number of local people to assist their existing crews. In addition, Snowshoe was able to bring back a large number of seasonal employees earlier, as a result of the many construction projects.

Weather permitting Snowshoe plans to start making snow early in November. The first day of skiing is scheduled for Friday, November 22. Snowshoe experienced 295,086 skier visits last season, its second highest total in history.
