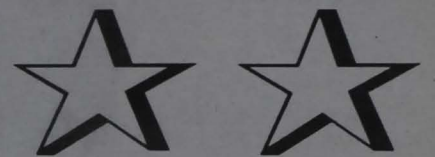


ATTENTION CAMPUS COMMUNITY

New Student Congress Officers Sworn in at Banquet March 18

Spring is a time of rejuvenation. Nature sheds her trappings of yesterday, and life begins anew. In keeping with this spirit, the 1991-92 Glenville Student Congress held a banquet on Wednesday, March 18, to pass on its responsibilities to its 1992-93 counterparts. During the banquet, the Pioneer Musket and the Spirit Award were presented, the members of the 1992-93 Student Congress were sworn in, and the passing of the keys from the old officers to the new officers was held.

The occasion began with welcoming speech by 1991-92 President Cathy Harbert. Dr. Al Billips, Student Congress advisor, led the guests in the invocation.

After a dinner consisting of shrimp, steamship round, baked potatoes and fruit salad, the award was presented by Billips. Dexter Starcher, the 1991-92 Pioneer, was given the Pioneer Musket. Billips commented on the excellent job that Starcher did, describing how he would now be a part of GSC history. Jeremy Brown was given the Spirit Award on behalf of Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity. Billips also commended Delta Zeta and Sigma Sigma Sigma sororities on their contributions to college spirit.

Harbert was presented with a plaque by Billips on behalf of the 1991-92 Student Congress. The plaque was inscribed "Appreciation and Thanks to Cathy Harbert." Jeannie Bennett-Brady was also presented a plaque for her duties during the fall of 1990 and for her help on the 1991 homecoming. Brady had been elected Student Congress President for 1991-92, but left school to work for the FBI in

August of 1991. Her award was accepted by Mandy Sauer.

The members of the 1992-93 also took their oath of office. They were sworn in by Dr. William K. Simmons, president of GSC. The keys of office were passed from the old officers to the new officers.

Marty Prine, president of the 1992-93 Student Congress, gave a short speech thanking all of the people who supported him and the other members of the new congress and helped them get elected.

Billips stated that he is confident of the ability of the new Student Congress, as most of them have had previous experience and know their jobs well.

"I consider it a strong slate of experienced leaders," Billips stated, and added that they won't be "cutting their teeth."

"I'm pretty excited," stated Prine. "I consider it a challenge to equal the past president. It's a tough job, but I have good people."

Prine also went on to say that past experiences in Student Congress will help a lot.

Other members of the 1992-93 Student Congress are: Tina Messenger, vice president; Benedette Brooks, secretary; Stephanie Graves, Treasurer; Lori Nicholas, Parliamentarian. Class representatives are: Cathy Copen, senior; Dottie Starcher, junior; Brian Spiker, sophomore; and Andre Dekok, commuter representative. Senators-at-large include: Lisa Mathis, William James, Jeremy Brown, Sally Smith, Heather Messenger, and Jill Harmon.

Kick-off speaker is Congressman Bob Wise, lunch

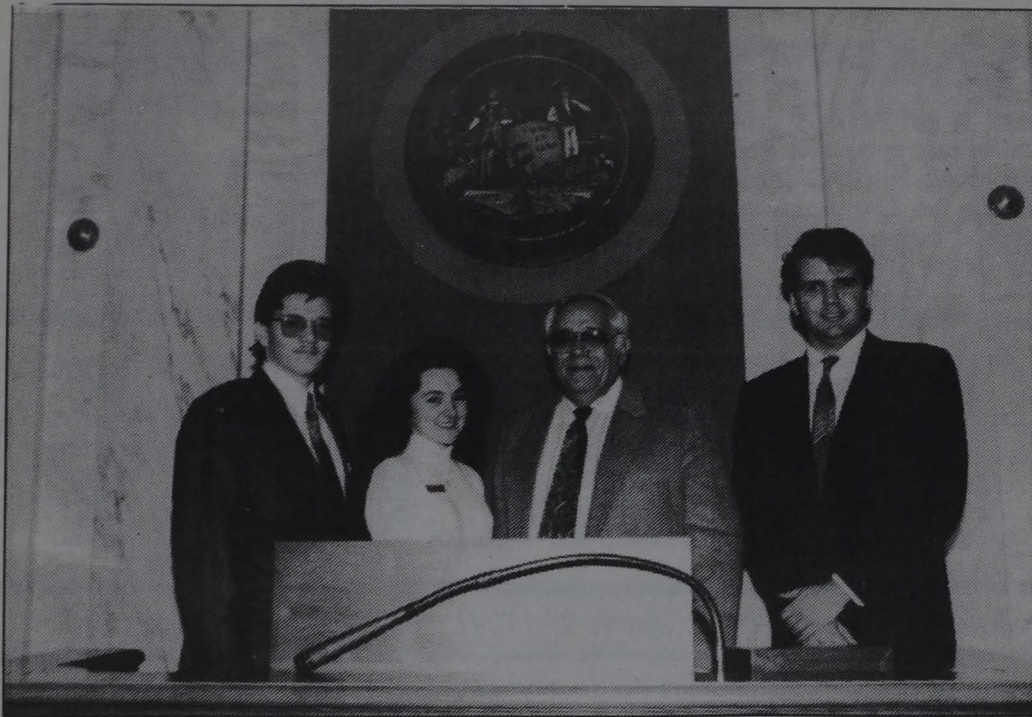
speaker is Governor Gaston Caperton, and keynote speaker is Congressman Alan Mollohan.

According to George Harper, gallery coordinator, the exhibition usually presents varied examples of drawings, paintings, printmakings, ceramics, sculptures, and crafts from the photo-realistic

to the totally abstract and non-objective styles.

During the previous 14 years, the annual show has involved 1,295 students, entering 1,808 pieces of artwork from 69 schools.

According to Harper, a variety of awards are given at the show, including four-and two-year tuition free scholarships to study art at Glenville State College.

Limit Means Service With a Smile Instead of Greedy Smirk

Due to the Congressional check bouncing scandal, the issue of limiting the number of terms that a member of Congress may serve has again become popular. Twelve states already have such proposals on their ballots for this fall, while 18 more plan to add the proposal in future elections. In addition, 31 states have limited the number of terms their governors may serve.

I agree with this proposal because I feel our representatives would be more likely to enact measures that would benefit the country instead of concentrating on their re-election campaigns.

Opponents feel that the country will suffer if this proposal is enacted. They feel that there will be too many inexperienced congressmen. My response is that an increased turn over rate is not necessarily a bad thing. (The Congressional turnover rate could stand to be increased - it was only 7.6 percent for the 1988 election.) I feel that Congress would benefit from hearing some new voices with fresh ideas.

Finally, with a limit placed on the number of terms they may serve, maybe members of Congress won't become accustomed to the perks that go along with their position, and in turn won't lose sight of the true reason they hold that position - to serve the American people.

Former GSC Professor to Portray Governor Marland

The Glenville State College community will have the opportunity on Wednesday, April 1, at 1:30 p.m. in the Art and Music Auditorium to get reacquainted with two "old friends". Former Governor William C. Marland will come to the GSC campus and discuss his colorful but troubled 1952-1956 tenure as West Virginia's 24th governor. Dr. Paul Lutz, a former member of GSC's Social Science Division, will also return to campus. This

April 1 opportunity is made even more remarkable by the fact that Governor Marland died in Chicago in 1965....

Actually, since leaving GSC, Lutz has developed a colorful, animated and exciting presentation based on the life of Bill Marland. Lutz joined the GSC faculty after having earned a Ph. D. in history from WVU. Lutz is currently a member of the Social Science Faculty at Marshall University. His presentation is

supported by the West Virginia Humanities Council.

Few of West Virginia's governors have faced the problems—both personal and political—which confronted Bill Marland. West Virginia's coal-fired economy slumped badly in the early 1950's though the state did manage to keep up its honored political traditions of petty bickering and political corruption. Bill Marland had his own demons to face as he

was an alcoholic. Marland struggled with himself, his many political foes, and a faltering economy yet he pushed a progressive political agenda—one which, sadly, was never enacted. Marland left West Virginia with his political career in ruins and his slide into alcoholism deepening. He was "discovered" driving a taxicab in Chicago only months before he died of cancer in 1965. He was 47 years old.

Lutz will do a presentation based on the tragic life and troubled times of Bill Marland. Lutz's presentation will also touch on some of the issues which plagued Governor Marland's administration and still characterize this state's sordid and sad political history. Following the monologue, Lutz is open to questions from the audience about the information in the presentation.

Nominations Sought For Pioneer and Representative

Any student who will be a senior next year may enter his name for Pioneer at the Office of Student Services. He or she must have a 2.0 grade point average and attend home football and

A pioneer outfit is provided by Student Congress and a musket valued at \$300.00+, boots and coonskin hat will be given to the Pioneer at the end of his/her year's service. In the event no seniors run for this position nominations will be extended for juniors to be nominated.

The position for student representative to the Glenville State College Board of Advisors is an opportunity for any student, regardless of classification, to be elected to represent the student body at the policy recommending level for the college. It requires

attending four of five board meetings during the year and providing student input into the goals and mission of the college. This level of leadership will look good on one's resume.

Deadline for nominations is Thursday, April 4, at 4 p.m! The election will be held on Monday and Tuesday, April 13 and 14.

Glenville State Golf Team Wins Greensboro Invitational

The GSC golf team opened the season by capturing first place at the Greensboro Invitational on March 2 and 3 at Greensboro, North Carolina.

The golfers shot a two over par for the tournament, shooting 289-289 for a total 578 over the two-day tournament.

Junior Patrick Geraghty received the medalist honor by shooting a 70-71 for a score of 141. Vance Fitzsimmons placed second shooting a 70-73 for a 143 score. Michael Barrett finished in sixth place shooting 74-71 for a total of 145. Mike Stills placed

19th shooting 74-75 for a total of 149. Ben Moore shot 77-76 for a total of 153.

"We were hoping to finish in the top five," said Coach Tim Carney. He went on to add "I've never had a team shoot that well for two consecutive days."

The golfers were back in action on March 13, 14, and 15 for the James Madison Spring Classic and made another strong showing by finishing fifth out of 14 teams. Freshman Michael Barrett finished in seventh place shooting 79-76-70 for a three-day total of 225.

Geraghty shot 79-78-72 for a 229 total and a 17th place finish. Fitzsimmons and Stills both shot 232 and placed 28th shooting a 78-72-82 and 75-77-80, respectively. Colin Cassidy shot 82-78-79 for a 239 and a 48th place finish, and Ben Moore placed 63rd shooting a 80-83-83 for a three-day total of 246.

The golfers will be in action this weekend March 26 and 27, as they host their own tournament, The Glenville State Invitational at the Oxbow Golf Club in Belpre, Ohio.

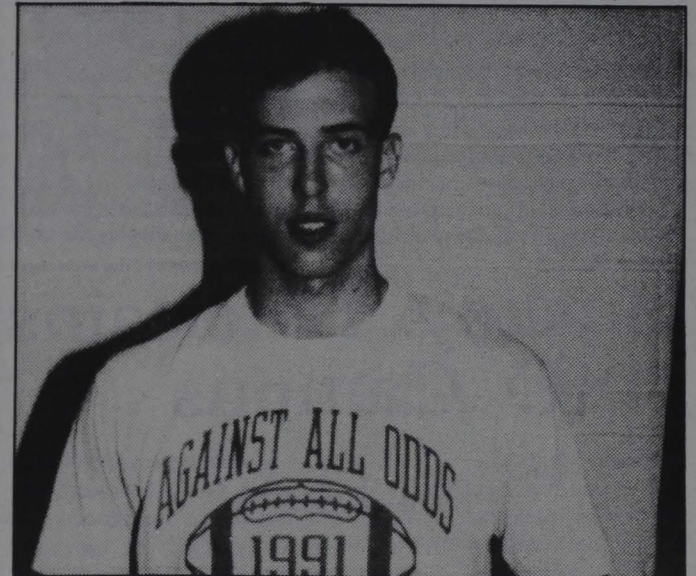

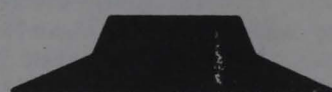
Norman, and Tim Marks. The Ensemble will be performing contemporary as well as popular selections. Examples of the selections are "Friends in Low Places," and "March to Scaffold."

What is a Percussion Ensemble? A percussion instrument might be described as anything that is rattled, struck, shaken, or rubbed to produce a sound. Percussion instruments can have definite pitch such as a piano, marimbe, xylophone, or tympani drums, and indefinite pitches, such as cymbals, maracas, or an anvil. The percussion section is sometimes called the kitchen of the orchestra. In combination,

the percussion instruments make up a remarkable ensemble which is capable of intense dramatic effects as well as tender melodies.

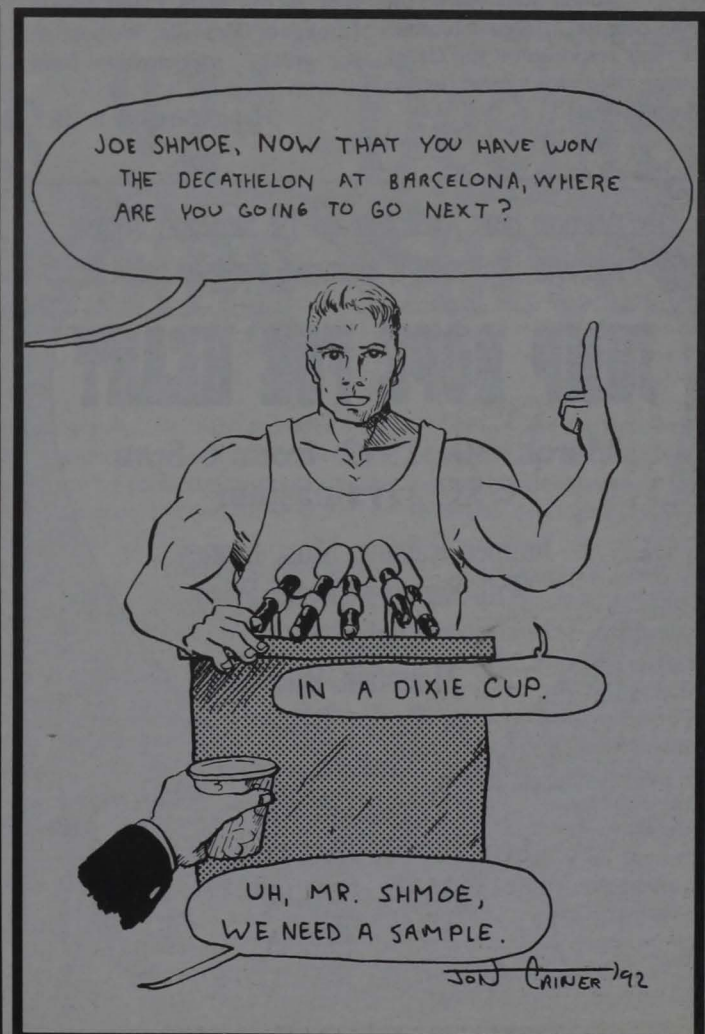
