The first ever rural procurement conference for West Virginia Small Businesses, sponsored by the Small Business Administration and Glenville State College, was held on Friday, March 27 at GSC. The day-long, statewide conference hosted more than 400 people including Governor Gaston Caperton, and Congressmen Bob Wise and Alan Mollohan.

During an afternoon address, Caperton discussed the difference between economic development and economic growth. He remarked that the conference, "Focus 92," was appropriately named as Focus implies a concentrated look at jobs and economic development.

Co-director of "Focus 92," Raymond A. Oliverio, said, "I think the conference was a smashing success. It truly exceeded our expectations. We hope that it will have a rejuvenating effect on the economy of Glenville and Central West Virginia."

"I challenged participants to make the conference pro-active; at the end of the day, Barbara Weaver, co-director of "Focus 92," reported that 17 deals were made during the conference. Some of the companies who entered into these new agreements were Chesterfield Energy Corp., Natural Gas Trasportation Co., Hope Natural Gas, and Grumman Corp.," said Oliverio.

"The conference showcased diverse small businesses of West Virginia, their sophisticated skills, resources and competence. It also explored new market opportunities for these businesses and the development of partnerships and joint ventures among conference participants. Economic development initiatives for rural areas such as Glenville are a natural spinoff of the urban renewal now underway in West Virginia," said Oliverio.

Co-director Barbara Weaver, said "The conference not only met, but exceeded our wildest expectations. It was a very fruitful event. Several deals were made during the course of the day, but better than that -- long term relations were begun by the brightest and the best of the West Virginia small business community. My co-director, Ray Oliverio is to be commended for his vision in realizing that rural West Virginia is ready for conferences like "Focus 92."

GSC To Host Physical Plant Conference

Glenville State College is hosting the semi-annual meeting of the West Virginia Physical Plant Administrators, April 5-7. The Convention Center at Flatwoods is the site of the conference which will see approximately 45 representatives from the State College and University systems, and nearly 100 total participants.

According to Bruce Hathaway, director of the Glenville State College physical plant, between 20 and 30 different manufacturers will be represented at the meeting.

The education portion of the conference will include

seminars on radon, the Americans with Disabilities Act. and maintenance of athletic fields.

Entertainment at the conference will include a tour of the Burnsville Dam, dinner at Glenville State College with an address by Dr. William K. Simmons, president, and a performance by the North Carolina Dance Theatre in the Auditorium of the Art and Music Building of Glenville State College.

"There is one extremely important facet of the program and this is the experience exchange. If we have a problem we can bring

and see what other colleges and universities have done to solve a similar problem. This period of activity also helps us keep abreast changes in laws - - for instance EPA and OSHA," said Hathaway.

"I think that this is a good opportunity for Glenville State College to showcase its new Art and Music Building and the campus which we are very proud of," said Hathaway.


