Miss Glenville State College, Amber Helen Holbert was crowned on Thursday, April 2 in the GSC Art and Music Auditorium.

More than 300 people, including five members of the Miss West Virginia Executive Board, attended the scholarship pageant. Holbert's winnings include \$1,650 in scholarship money, \$1,110 in prizes, and the opportunity to compete in the Miss West Virginia Pageant in

Riggs, Alumnus of the Year

Dr. Donald E. Riggs, a 1964 graduate of Glenville State College, has been selected as the 1992 Alumnus of the Year. Riggs is the first librarian to receive this high honor from the association.

Riggs currently holds the position dean of the University Library and professor of information and library studies at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. The collection of the University of Michigan's Library is the fifth largest in the nation.

Riggs, born in Middlebourne, Tyler County, in 1942, is a 1960 graduate of Tyler County High School. In 1964, Riggs graduated from GSC with a B.A. in biology and a minor in library science. He holds an M.A., from WVU; M.L.S., University of Pittsburgh; Ed.D., VPI, Blacksburg.

While a student at GSC, Riggs was a member of Chi Beta Phi, Student Government Association, Kappa Sigma Kappa and Theta Xi fraternity as well as working in the college cafeteria.

After graduating from GSC Riggs has held the position of head librarian and science teacher at Warwood High School in Wheeling WV; librarian at Wheeling High School; science

and economics librarian at Bluefield State College and for three years both Bluefield and Concord. Riggs was Director of Libraries at the University of Colorado at Denver and dean of University Libraries at Arizona State University, Tempe, AZ (1979-90) before assuming his current position at the University of Michigan.

Riggs is a member of many organizations, at the top of which is the American Library Association. In those organizations, he has served in many leadership positions in state and national organizations.

Riggs is the author of 10 books on various library subjects. He has written 21 book chapters and at least 35 journal articles and technical reports.

Don is married to the former Jane Francine Vasbinder, also a 1964 graduate of GSC. Jane Riggs is a teacher and CPA. They have two daughters, Janna Jennifer, age 16 and Krista Dyonis, 14.

Alumni Association Dedicates Parlor to McKown

The Glenville State College Alumni Association will dedicate a parlor in the Alumni Center in memory of Linda Lambiotte McKown, Saturday, April 26.

Mrs. McKown joined the faculty of Glenville State College in 1979 as director of theatre. She became director of public relations

and alumni affairs in 1985 and served in that capacity until her death, November 25, 1989.

Mrs. McKown was instrumental in organizing a group of alumni and administration that made the decision to pursue the purchase of the John E. Arbuckle House as an Alumni Center. After Mrs. McKown became the director,

it was her foresight that made this dream a reality. The Foundation Inc. borrowed \$65,000 to purchase the Arbuckle House.

On November 9, 1990, after four and a half years of contributions, the Arbuckle House became the Alumni Center. Mrs. McKown had been ill for some time and it was her desire to see

the Center paid for before she died. However, this was not to be. As a result of her death, the Center received contributions in her memory which helped retire the debt along with the generous gift of James W. Curry, for whom another parlor is named.

Linda is survived by her husband, Edward McKown,

assistant professor of music education at GSC and her mother, Local Davis Lambiotte of Grantsville. The dedication will be held on Alumni Day, April 25, at 3 p.m. at the Alumni Center, 213 North Court Street Glenville, WV. The dedication is open to the public.

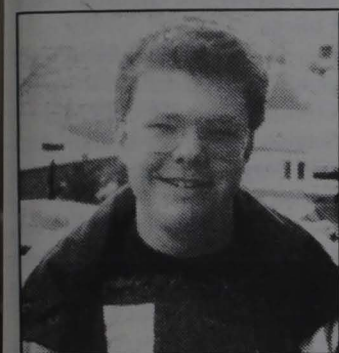

Do you think the fighting among the Democratic candidates and the Republican candidates for president helps or hurts the parties? Why or why not?

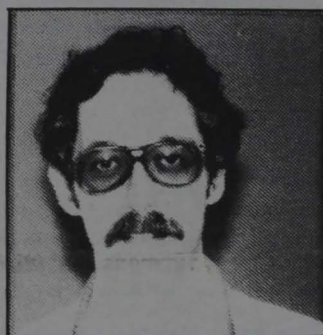

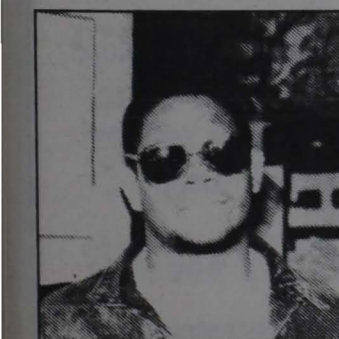
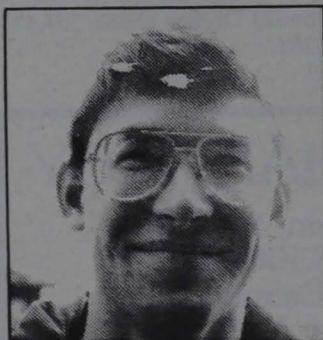

The Glenville State College Alumni Service Award for 1992 will be given to two individuals who have contributed much to Glenville State College and the Association. Gregory C. Nicholson and Joyce G. Geyh will be honored at the annual Alumni Day Banquet, April 25.

Nicholson, a 1973 graduate of GSC, past president of the GSC Alumni Association and member of the Council for many years will receive one of the Service Awards.

Nicholson served on the committee that made the decision to pursue the purchase of the Arbuckle House for the Alumni Center. According to Nicholson, he is very pleased to have been the President of the Association when the mortgage was retired November 9, 1990. Nicholson continues to contribute his expertise. He is responsible for getting a landscape plan for the

Alumni Center and producing a recruiting tape with the help of his wife, Bobbi.

Nicholson worked for many years with the GSC End Zone Club that raised funds for athletics. Before moving to Charleston, Nicholson was a member of the Gilmer County Fire Department for which he received a 20 year Service Award. He is a charter and former member of the Glenville Jaycees and a former member of the Independent Oil and Gas Association (IOGA). Nicholson is a member of the Building Owners and Managers Association and the Gilmer County Masonic Lodge #118. He is a 4-H All Star.

He is presently the director of the leasing division for the State of WV Department of Administration. He is married to Barbara Ocheltree Nicholson. They reside in Elkview with their two children Amanda, age 20 and

Matthew, 13.

Geyh, a 1953 graduate of GSC from Tiffin, Ohio is also receiving the Service Award. She and the Reverend Arthur M. Geyh have been instrumental in seeing that the Alumni Center has been tastefully decorated. It is with Joyce's knowledge of art and the 1910 period that we were able to coordinate the furnishings of the Center.

Geyh first became interested in the Alumni Center when a room was dedicated in memory of Fern Huff Rollyson, with whom she lived as a student while at GSC. Joyce and Arthur donated the linens and accessories to make the room complete.

After working with Fern's room Joyce was gracious enough to give some expert advice on decorating the remainder of the house. They seemed to enjoy hunting for bargains and the right

pieces for the center if we asked them to do so. Not only that, but the Geyhs would make long trips from Tiffin to make deliveries. Without their help and generosity, you would not be enjoying the comfort that the center offers.

Joyce was born at Malona, Rhodes (Dodecanese Islands) Greece and came to the U.S. in 1937 through Ellis Island. Her father was employed in Weirton, WV.

Joyce has a B.A. in education from GSC; M.A., Ohio State University and additional work at Bowling Green and Miami Universities. She had a total of 34 years of teaching to her credit before retiring. GSC Creates Regional Science and Math Center

Glenville State College has been awarded a U.S. Department of Education grant to create a regional math and science center for high school students from Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia.

A primary objective of

the center is to increase the number of first-generation college students from low income families, who choose math and science as a career.

Participants in the project, high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors, will be exposed to radio astronomy, environmental science, field biology, applied math, and polymer and nuclear chemistry. The program, slated for June 21-July 31, will include trips to National Radio Astronomy Observatory, Green Bank, WV;

Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Atomic Energy Museum, Oak Ridge, TN; Great Smokey Mountains, Johnson City, TN; Eastman Kodak Polymer Laboratories, Kingsport, TN; Hazardous Waste Lab, West Virginia Department of Natural Resources, Charleston, WV; Allegheny Observatory, Pittsburgh, PA; and Pittsburgh Zoological Park, Pittsburgh, PA.

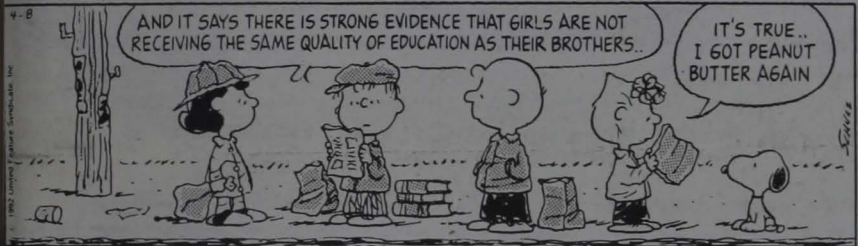

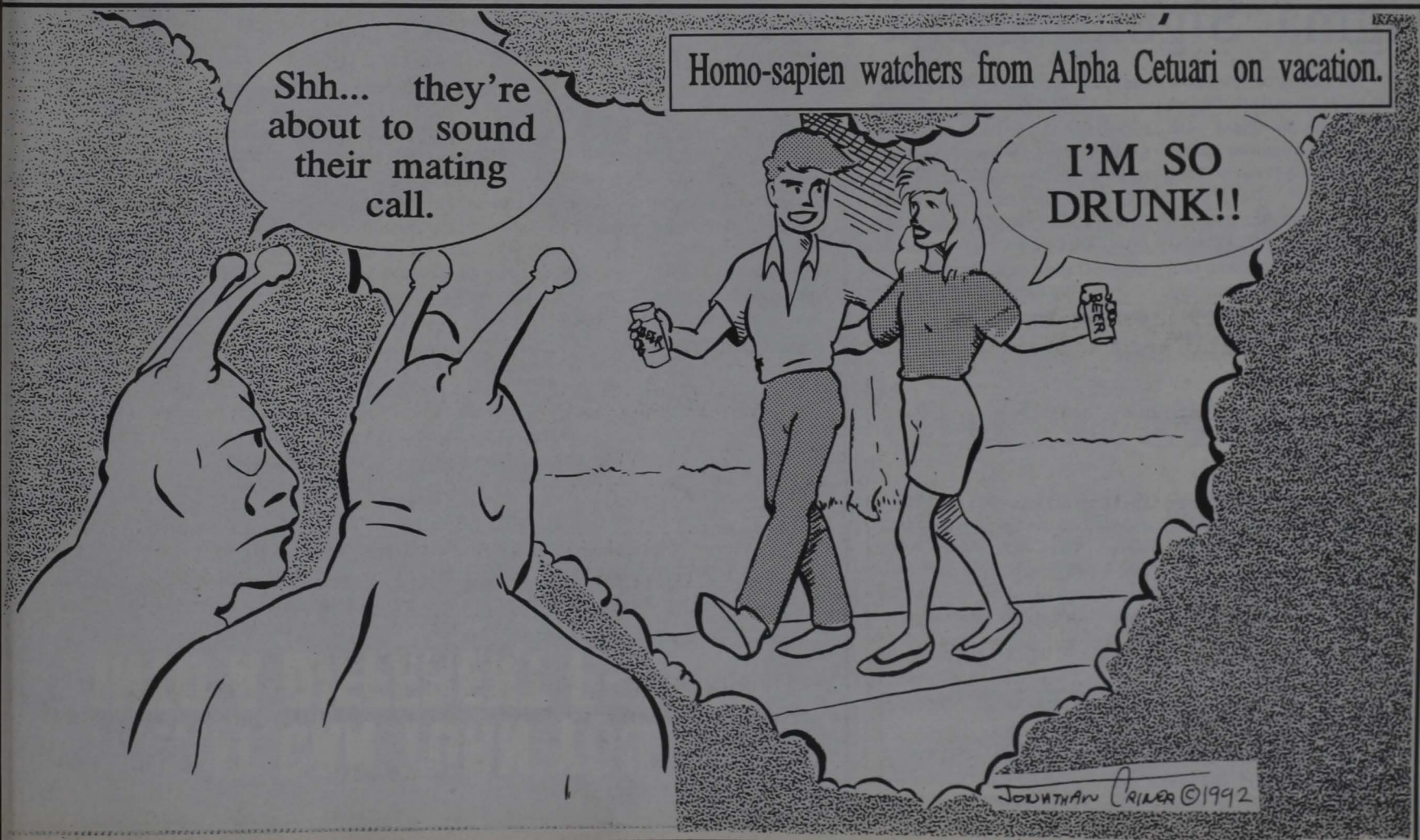
