Wemm is a member of many civic and professional organizations, including West Virginia Theatre Conference (president-elect), Southeastern



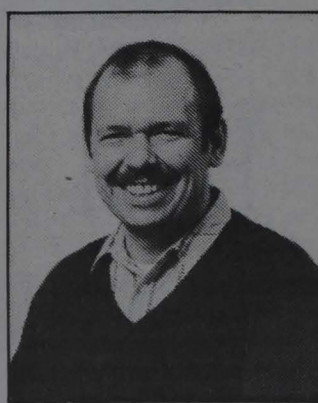

Gayle Burkowski has been promoted to the rank of assistant professor of English.

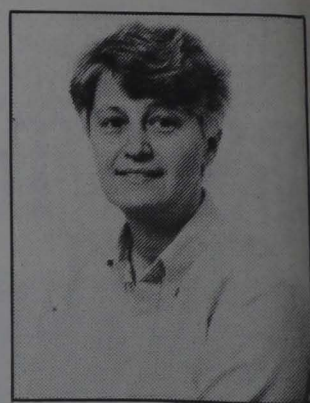

## News from RFK Library

### Who was Robert F. Kidd?

Have you ever wondered who Robert F. Kidd was? As much as we use the library that bears his name, we should know some facts about this great man.

Robert Franklin Kidd was born in Upshur County in 1853. In 1882 he became the principal of Glenville Normal School, which later became Glenville State College. Kidd remained at Glenville Normal School until 1884. He then began practicing

law, and in 1887 he was elected to the West Virginia House of Delegates.

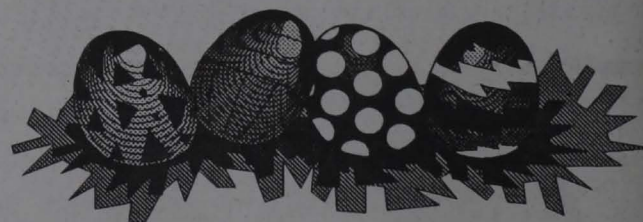
Kidd served as a member of the West Virginia State Senate from 1899 to 1915, and again from 1922 to 1927.

Robert F. Kidd died in 1930. A memorial service was held in his honor in the Hall of the House of Delegates on March 12, 1931.

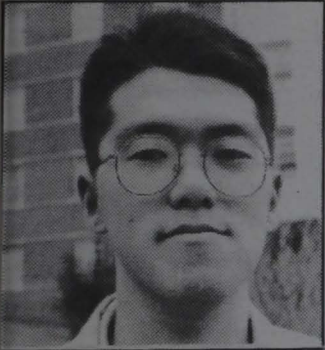

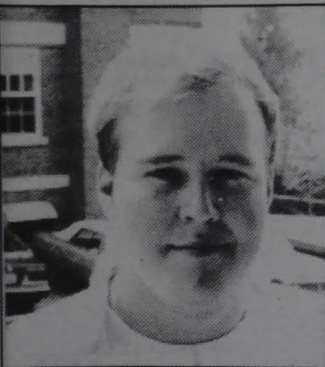

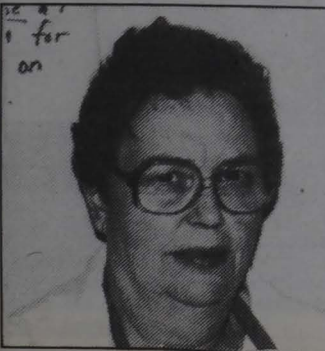

First of all, the submission must have reached us by the deadline. Almost every issue of *The Mercury* contains a statement explaining the deadline for items submitted for publication, but in case you've missed it, **items must be received by the Tuesday one week prior to publication.** It takes time to plan everything that goes into this newspaper and to decide how to present it. Some people don't seem to understand this and invariably call on Monday afternoon (press day) wanting to submit something.

Another factor I must consider is the appropriateness of the material. If the item just isn't college newspaper material (i.e. political campaign promos) or if the same subject has been covered previously, I will choose to publish something else. Sometimes I wonder if the only items some people read are the ones they submit themselves. So please read the paper before you submit something - someone may have beaten you to it.

Finally, if I receive something from an individual or department that hasn't submitted anything previously, I am more inclined to publish that item rather than devoting space repeatedly to the same person or department. *The Glenville Mercury* is a forum for the campus community, and we encourage your submissions.

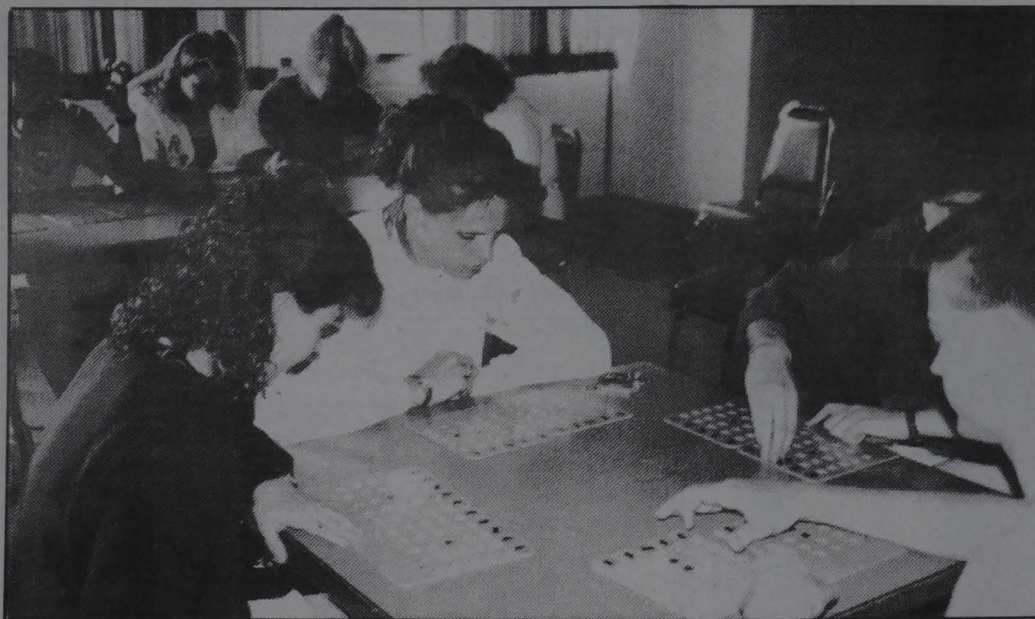

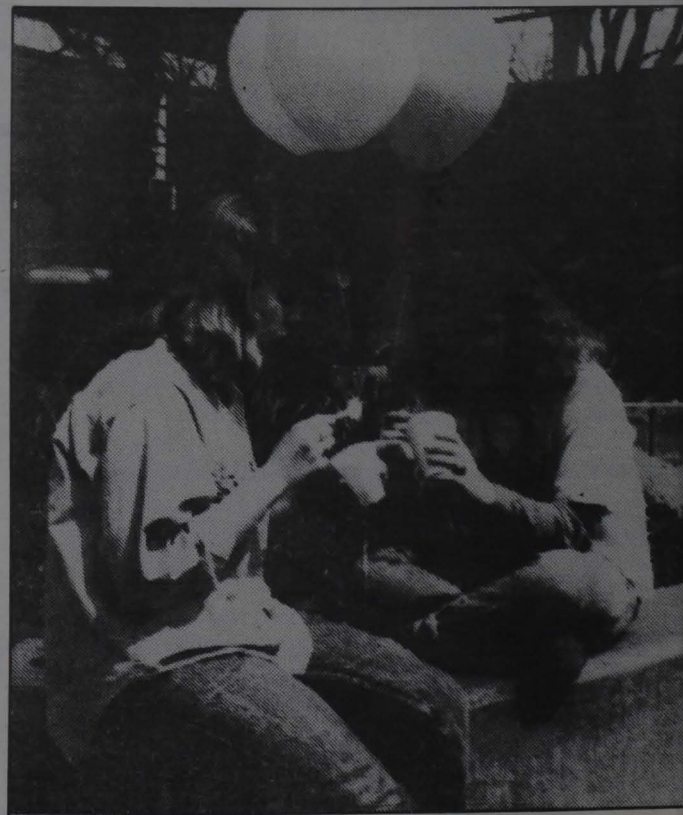

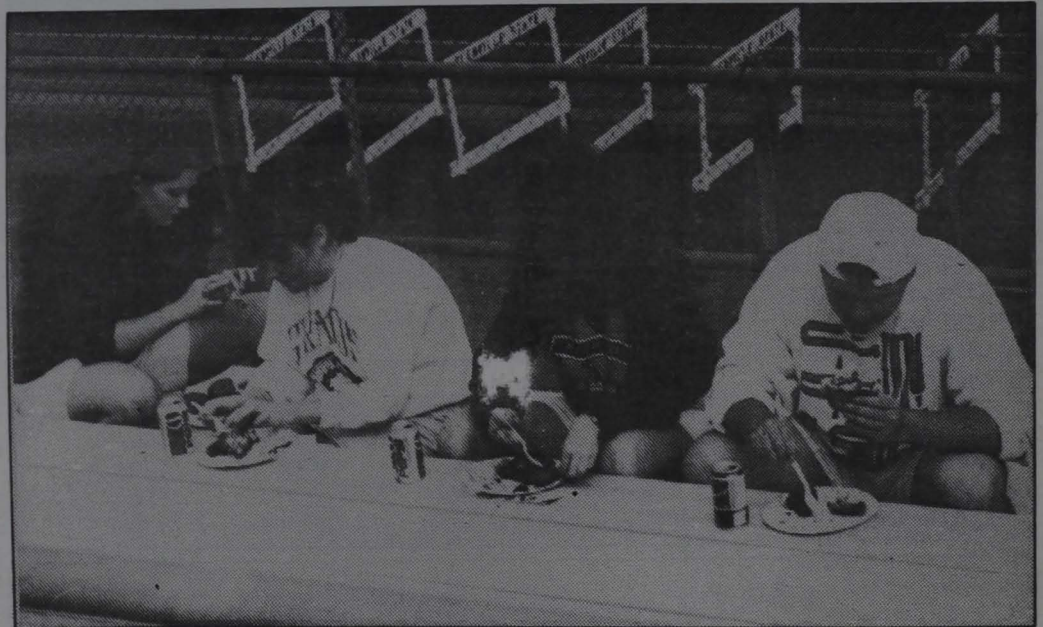

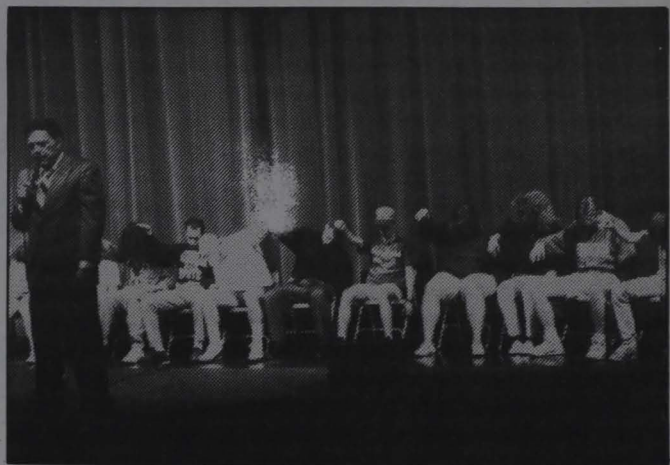
