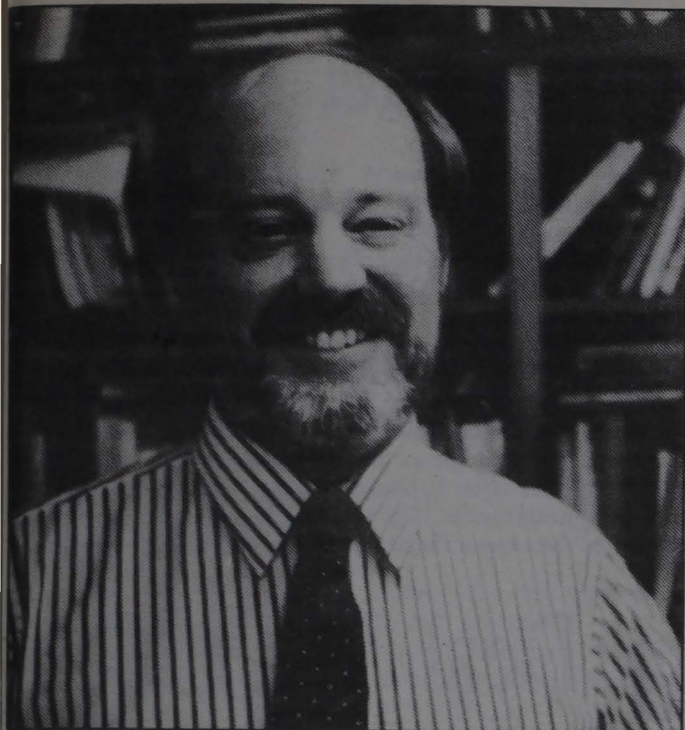

Hilgenberg Authors Book on Japanese-American Relations

Dr. James Hilgenberg will soon be adding to his long list of accomplishments. *From Enemy To Ally*, written by Hilgenberg, will be published by University Press of America.

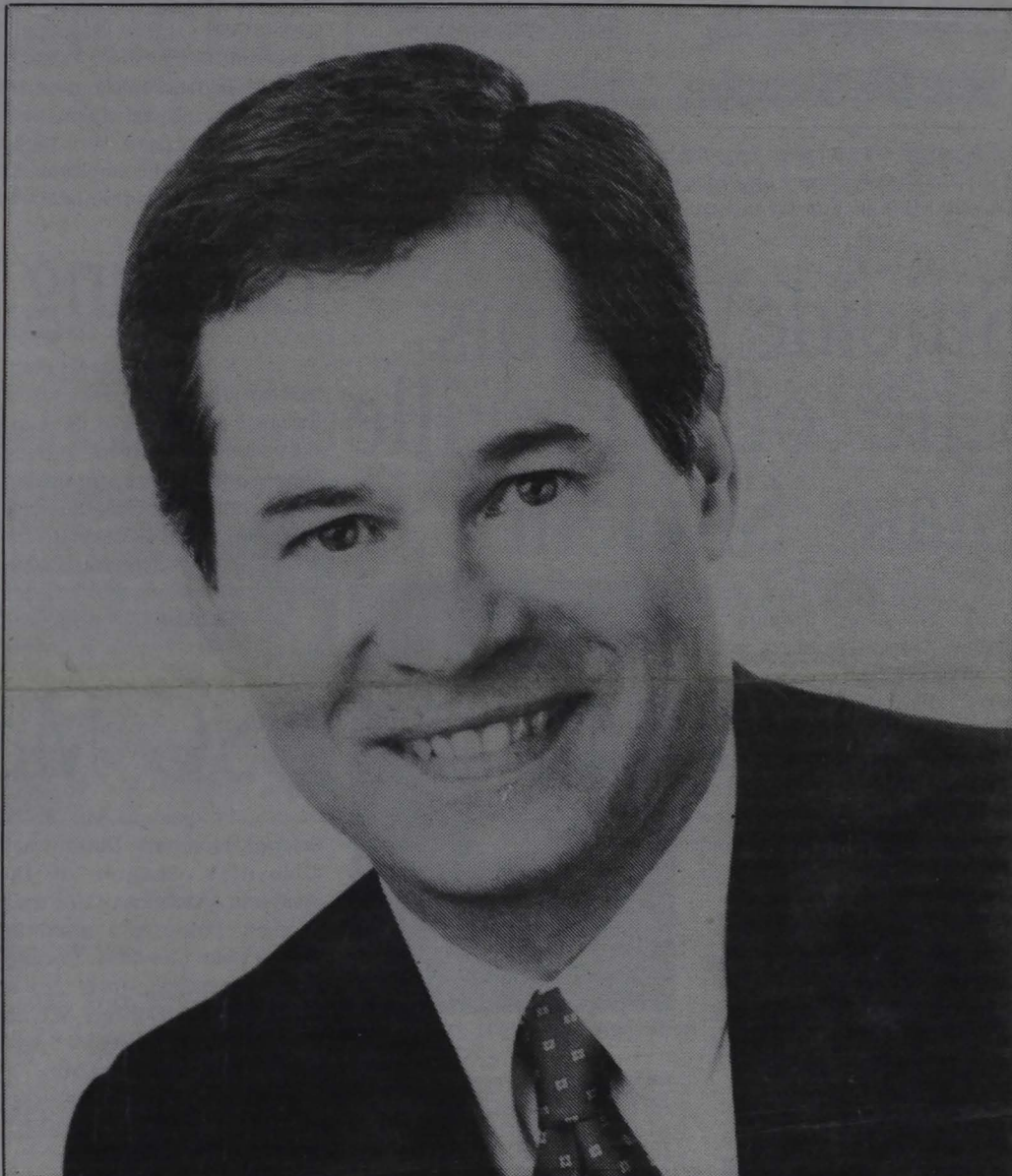
From Enemy To Ally examines Japanese-American relations during the early years of the Cold War when the United States occupied Japan. Hilgenberg is an authority on this topic, as it was the focus of his doctoral dissertation.

Hilgenberg explained that a focal point of the book was the United States' desire to become allied with Japan. He explained, "We wanted [Japan] to be our allies instead of the Soviet Union's."

Hilgenberg received his bachelor's degree from Baker University in Kansas, and his

master's degree from the University of South Dakota. In 1978, the same year he began teaching full-time at GSC, he received his Ph.D. from West Virginia University. Hilgenberg is also the Faculty Advisory Council representative to the State College System of West Virginia Board of Directors, a member of Faculty and Course Development in International Studies organization, involved with Elderhostel and the West Virginia Historical Association.

From Enemy To Ally will be available next winter in both hardback and paperback, and will be distributed nationally - including Glenville State College's bookstore. In addition, Hilgenberg is writing a textbook for Prentice Hall publishers on modern Japanese history due next fall.

Mollohan To Address Glenville Graduates

Congressman Alan B. Mollohan, member of the U.S. House of Representatives from the First District of West Virginia, will address the 118th graduating class of Glenville State College on Saturday, May 9, at 10 a.m. Mollohan, an education advocate, will address a graduating class of 386, the largest in the history of the college.

During the ceremony, Mollohan will be awarded an honorary doctorate of humane

letters. The honorary doctorate, the highest honor given by the college, has been awarded only once previously.

Mollohan was elected to the 98th Congress in November 1982 and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress.

He serves on the House Appropriations Committee and its subcommittee on V.A., H.U.D. and Independent Agencies and its subcommittee on Commerce, Justice, State and Judiciary. He is

an Executive Committee member of the Congressional Steel caucus and a member of the Coal Group.

In the U.S. House of Representatives, Mollohan has specialized in addressing the economy, fair trade practices, veterans health care issues, coal and education. He has initiated projects aimed at increasing local economical development, and is a prime sponsor of the West Virginia High-Technology

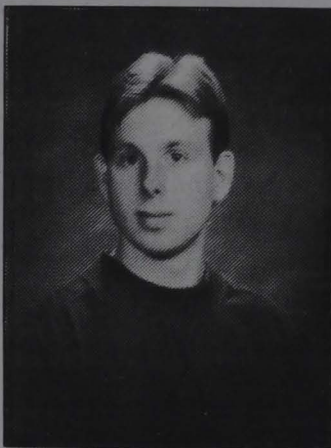

The Glenville State College student died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head on Wednesday, April 22. The incident took place at the intersection of Route 33-119 and Brooklyn Drive in Glenville, at 4:45 p.m.

A local memorial service, officiated by Reverend Michael Amory, is scheduled for Wednesday, April 29 at 2 p.m. at the Trinity United Methodist Church on Main Street.

BCM Raises Money for Homeless

A special activity was conducted by the Baptist Campus Ministry on Monday, April 13, through Wednesday, April 15. In order to raise money for Habitat for Humanity, an organization for the housing of the homeless, seven female GSC students volunteered to become homeless for 48 hours.

In order to simulate this experience, the participants were required to spend two nights camped out in the amphitheater in boxes. They had no heat and

could not shower or use cosmetics. All the food they were allowed was donated by the church.

Volunteers for the project were Tammy Westfall, Melissa Morris, Tammy Butcher, Loretta Mullins, Jacque Keathley, Staci Roushe and Valleria White. A total of about \$500 was raised.

Before the beginning of the project, the volunteers had hoped for clear skies, but were greeted with rain instead. Among the seven, the women claimed a

total amount of seven hours of sleep the first night.

Another unfortunate by-product of homelessness exposed during the project: lack of compassion. On the first night the small camp was egged. The group had expected more respect.

The women who volunteered their time and effort for this project said they now are definitely aware of the problems of the homeless, and showed great appreciation for their warm homes.

Learning to Deal With Loss

Suicide is a tragic event that can affect many peoples lives. Today it is also one of the most misunderstood violent crimes. When someone close to you dies as the result of suicide, the range of emotions in the aftermath can include shock, sadness, fear, shame, anger, guilt, and unresolved grief.

One way to help deal with suicide is to talk about it; not the

details of the suicide itself, but memories of the lost one and the reasons for his or her decision to commit the act. Expressing feelings - all of them - in front of others is a natural way to deal with loss.

Disbelief may linger for a long time, and is a natural psychological reaction, but at the same time a person must acknowledge the fact that the

person is dead. He or she should not suppress the pain. Realizing the loss while at the same time cherishing the memories of shared experiences aids in the healing process.

One of the final steps, and also one of the hardest, is developing new relationships. By redirecting love, a person moves forward.

GSC Meets the Candidates

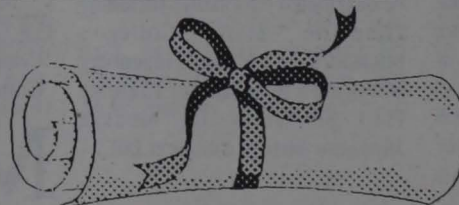

The Delta Zeta girls are still collecting aluminum cans to help benefit the burned children. All aluminum cans can be turned in at Foodland in Glenville. We

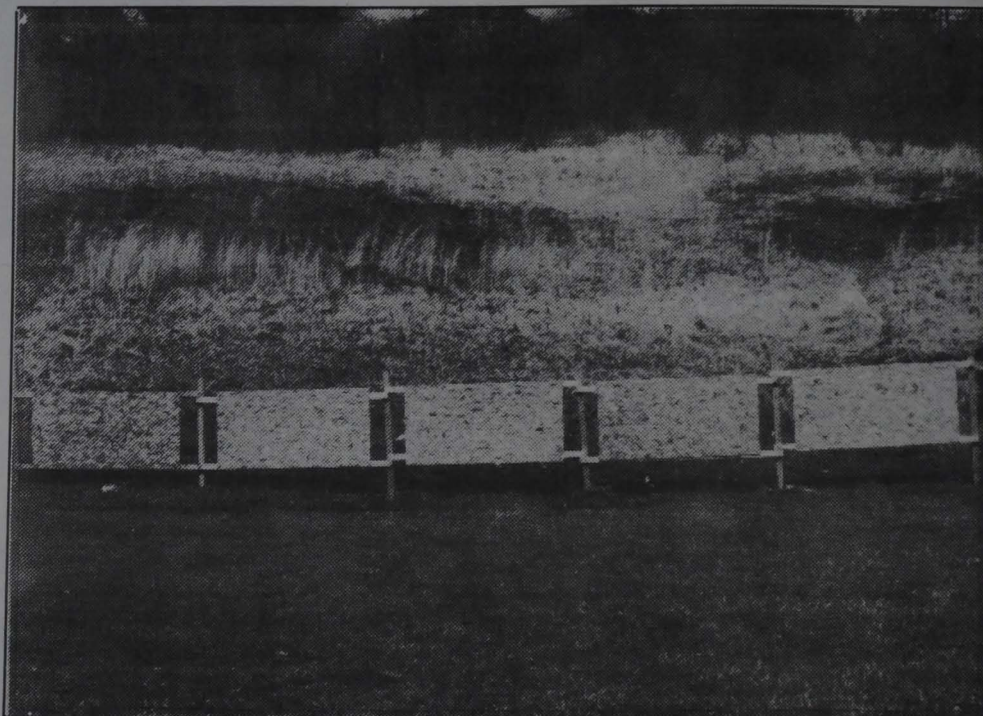
are also collecting plastic bottles to help the environment. We encourage everyone to do the same.

Glenville State Golfers Win Central Regional

The GSC Pioneer golf team took part in the central regional on April 19,20, and won the title by beating out Fairmont State who finished seven strokes back. The golfers' team totals were 301 on the first day and 294 the second day for a two-day total of 595. Fairmont State finished up second by shooting 303-299 for a total of 602, and University of Charleston placed third. U.C. won the first two regionals, the northern and southern regionals earlier this spring.

Medalist honors for the central regional went to GSC's Michael Barrett who shot 74-69 for a two-day total of 143. Patrick Geraghty shot 75-73 for a total of 148 and third place. Placing fifth overall was Colin Cassidy who shot 74-76 for a total of 150. Vance Fitzsimmons shot 78-78 for a total of 156 and Mike Stills shot 81-78 for a total of 157. GSC entered two golfers to play at-large, Andy Brode and A.J. Stewart. Brode shot 78-76 for a total of 154 and Stewart shot 79-79 for a total of 158.

White Team Topples Blue at Annual GSC Blue-White Scrimmage

The 1992 GSC football spring drills concluded last week with the annual Blue-White Game on Thursday at Pioneer Field.

The white team was led by returning quarterback Jed Drenning who threw three touchdown passes to lead the white team to a 34-24 win over the blue team. 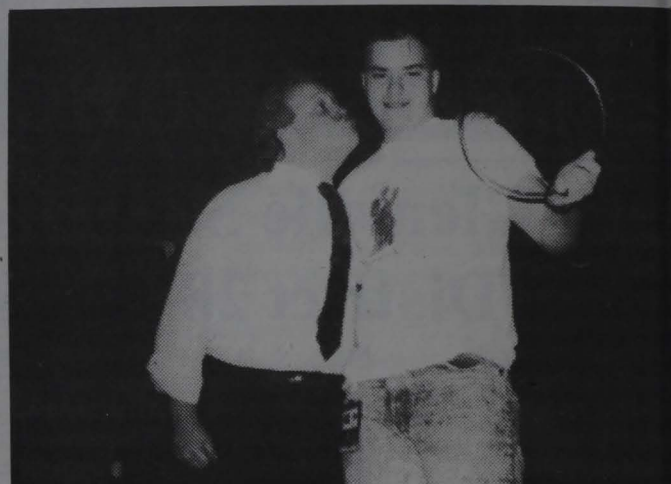

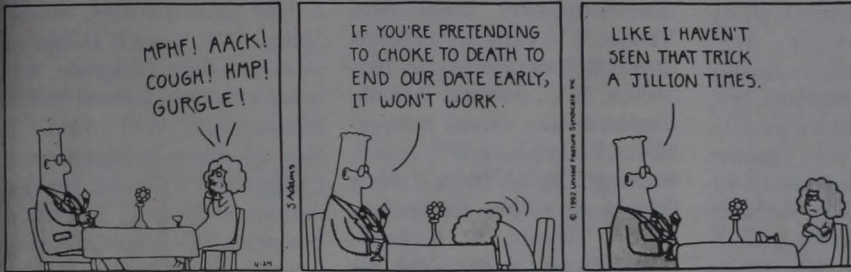

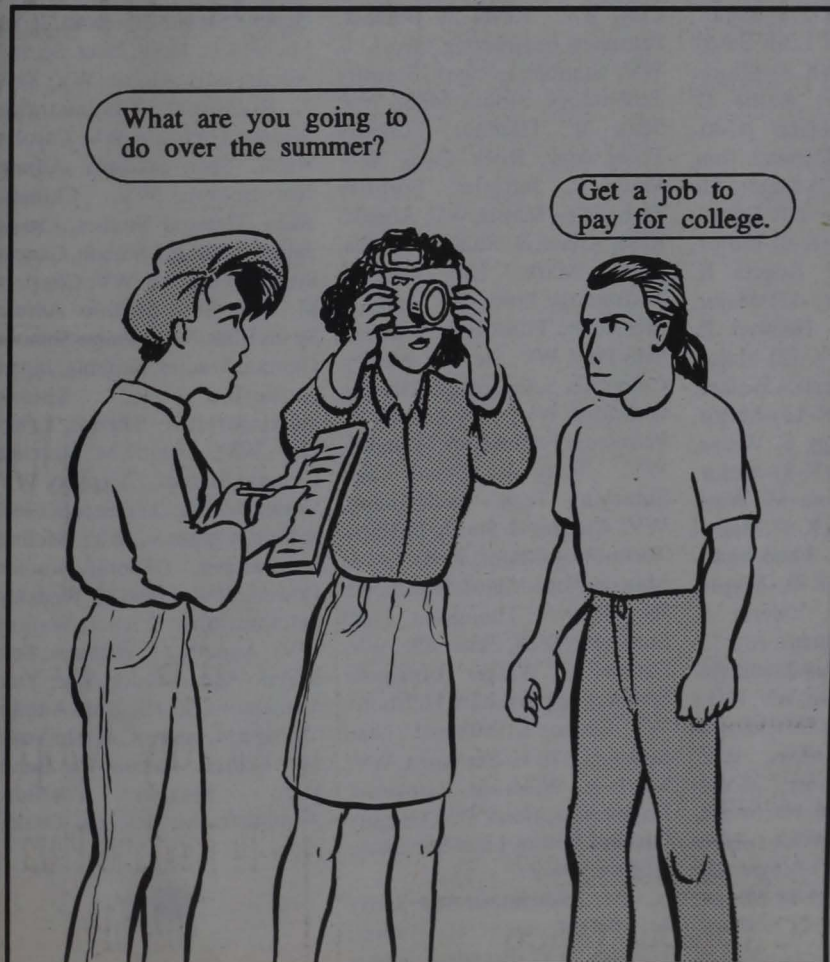
