Easy as A-B-C

Library's VTLS System Going Strong

The VTLS is a relatively easy system to operate. First off, the student must register for a card at the circulation desk. Every person that has a college I.D. card will have a bar code put on the back of it. Part-time students and community patrons will have a library card issued to them.

Over half of the 120,000 books in the library are now available through the new VTLS terminals located throughout the library. The terminals will show you ways in which you may search for a book. The three most common and effective ways to search are by author, title or by subject. For example, if you want to find out if the library owns *Marco Polo* by Robert N. Webb, you may find it in any of three ways.

To find it by the author, type in: a/Webb, Robert N. You will find that the library has two books by Webb, one on Genghis Kahn and the one you want on Marco Polo.

You can also find it by the title. Type in: t/followed by the title of the book. You can use up to the first four words of the title, ignoring "A," "An," or "The" if it is the first word of the title.

To find a book by its subject, type in: s/ Marco Polo. If you search by author, title or subject, you will find the same information which includes the call number of the book, and the "line mark status" will tell you if it is available, if it has been checked out, or if it is on reserve. If it is available, the book will be on the shelf ready to be checked out.

As was mentioned in last weeks issue, the VTLS can locate a book in other college libraries and public libraries in West Virginia. So to find a book at another location, just ask at the circulation desk.

GSC Fall Enrollment at 2,391

The unofficial enrollment at Glenville State College for fall 1992 has reached an all-time high of 2,391. This represents the seventh consecutive year that enrollment has topped 2,000 students.

The enrollment, which includes students from every West Virginia county and other states, includes a record number of freshman at 792.

According to GSC President Dr. William Simmons, "This year's record enrollment is a reflection of the public confidence in the quality of education at Glenville State College. While enrollment is not the sole measure of quality or success, it is a good indicator of the high esteem with which Glenville State College and Glenville State College Alumni are held."

Mack Samples, dean of records and admissions at GSC, reports that growth is strong in all areas. "We are seeing higher numbers on campus, at the Summers ville Center and in our extension classes in the area. We are also attracting more outof-state students and more international students." Samples went on to say that he was expecting a slight drop in head count enrollment because of the loss of the Parkersburg campus. "We easily made up the Parkersburg loss in other areas," Samples added.

The full-time equivalent (FTE) is 1,914 up 2.5 percent from last year. The FTE figure is determined by dividing the total number of hours for which students are enrolled by 15. Fifteen hours represents the Higher Education Board's figure for a full-time equivalent

Dates for General **Studies** Assessment Announced

Each student enrolled in bachelor's degree program wil be required to complete an examination of the General Stud ies Program. The results of this assessment program will be used for the purposes of curriculum assessment and design. The multiple-choice examination will not be considered a gateway examination.

Students who have completed 60 semester hours but not more than 75 semester hours will register and complete the General Studies Assessment during the time period of October 12 to 22. Students must register on a first-come, firstserve basis by contacting the Director of Assessment, Dr. Sharon Kraus, Clark Hall.

Students who have completed 75 hours of course work will not be permitted to register for additional work until they have completed the General Studies Assessment.

Please note: Students who have completed 75 hours at the beginning of the fall semester 1992 are exempt. Students who have not completed 60 hours at the beginning of the fall semester 1992 are not ready to participate this semester.

The General Studies Assessment will be administered in the Computer Lab in the Administration Building.





The GSC Pioneer Foot-ball Team bounced back from a tough loss last week to beat the Yellowjackets of West Virginia State 35-6 at Pioneer Stadium. West Virginia State came into the game ranked 5th nationally, while GSC was ranked 17th in the nation.

In last week's loss to Shepherd, the Pioneers turned the ball over 7 times, but this week only 2 turnovers were recorded, while State would lose possession of the ball 9 times due to turnovers on Saturday. Thirdyear head coach Rich Rodriguez commented on the performance of the Pioneers,"We played well on both sides of the ball, especially on defense." According to Rodriguez one of the keys to Saturday's victory was last week's practice. "Last week was the best week of practice this year."

Kathy Szeliga Named 12th Fan



GRE Testing to Begin in October

The Graduate Record Examinations (GRE) Program will begin offering the GRE general test on computer in mid-October. This fall's GRE Computer-Based Test (CBT) will be virtually the same as the current paper-and-pencil version. The CBT is scored in the same manner as the paper-and-pencil test, and score interpretive information is the same. The GRE Program conducted a pilot test of the CBT, and thorough analyses of the test results of more than 1,000 examinees who participated in the pilot showed that scores from the paper-and-pencil test and the computer-delivered test were comparable.

The CBT will be administered at least three days a week in about 100 centers throughout the United States, including ETS Field Service Offices, Sylvan Learning Center branches and some universities and colleges. Examinees can register for the CBT by using the registration form in the center of the CBT Supplement to the 1992-93 GRE Information Bulletin (see the Placement Office for a copy).
