New Nicholas County Library to House GSC/NCC Collection

On November 14, the new library for the Nicholas County Center branch of Glenville State College had its formal opening. The library, which is not a branch of the Robert F. Kidd library, was built because of the needs of the students and community of the Summersville area. The Nicholas County Public Library Commission owns and operates

the new library, which is located approximately 300 yards from the Nicholas County Center. The original county public library was moved from downtown Summersville to the ultramodern building constructed at the Nicholas County Center.

Glenville State College will be providing approximately \$20,000 a year in a budget which Continued on Page 2

will be used to purchase books, magazines and newspapers relevant to the students' needs, as well as \$10,000 in student assistance help and space rental fees. This money will allow materials to be purchased that originally, due to county budget restraints, could not. However, this money does not result from tuition raised on the Glenville campus but it will come from money generated from tuition raised from students attending the Nicholas County Center.

Rick Tubesing, GSC library director, said, "We won't lose materials or money on this campus because there are separate budgets for here and down there." He then went on to add, "No books or journals will be bought for the new library that aren't already present in the Kidd

Library. The two reasons for this being that the same courses are taught in both places so the same materials should be needed, and secondly, the cost and time involved in cataloging materials can be expensive so it would be easier to do the same book twice rather than do a different one each time."

The new library will operate in a very similar manner to the Robert F. Kidd library with check-out of books and materials on a first come, first serve basis. There will also be a reserve shelf containing books and materials set aside for various classes which will not circulate as well as a reference area. There will, however, be no media center in the new library, but students and the community in general should benefit greatly from the new facility.

Not only are individual counseling services provided on campus, but Ms. Nottingham and others work in close proximity with the Summit Center for Human Development and with professionals from the surrounding vicinity during times of crisis on our campus.

Recently a new organization called Students for International Understanding was formed at Gilmer County High School. One of our purposes is to help with worthy humanitarian aid to those who are victims of circumstances beyond their control. One group of people worthy of such aid are the children of war-torn Somalia, where a bitter civil war has waged over three years and thousands of people die daily.

The International Red Cross has established four refugee centers in Kenya. There are over 14,000 children in each of these camps. Through the Red Cross, we plan to construct Friendship Kits for these children. The kits are small boxes that contain such items as pencils, combs, toothbrushes, small toys, etc. In addition, we plan to help raise money for the many Red Cross kitchens established inside of Somalia. We plan to place a barrel in our school commons area, and ask students to bring pennies in to help our cause. We call this our "Pennies for Humanity" drive.

We would like to coordinate a county wide effort in which all churches and civic groups participate. Drenning Breaks WVIAC Passing Record

GSC Routs WV Tech 70-7

ball team finished the 1992 campaign with an impressive offensive display beating up on WV Tech, 70-7. The win moved the Pioneer record to 6-4 overall and 5-2 in the conference. It is the first time in several years that the Pioneers have ended the season with a winning record.

Pioneer quarterback, Jed Drenning, finished the year in becoming the WVIAC All-

The GSC Pioneer Foot- Time, single-season, passing, yardage leader on Saturday. Drenning completed 15 of 25 passes for 350 yards and 5 touchdowns. Drenning broke WV State's Ken Grier 1990 record of 3,322 passing yards. Drenning finished the 1992 season with 3,350 yards. In all, 7 Pioneer players scored a touchdown. On the receiving end, Chris George caught 6 passes for 157 yards and made 2 touchdowns. The ground attack was led by Kevin Blanding, who gained 148 yards on 21 carries, scored 2 rushing touchdowns and caught a 65yard pass for a score.

The defensive unit held WV Tech to only one touchdown for the game and gave up only 69 passing yards. Randall Olds led the charge as he recorded 7 solo tackles 3 assist, 6 sacks and broke up a pass.

The GSC Women's Volleyball team ended its 1992 season, finishing 1-3 at the WVIAC Tournament in Charleston on Friday and Saturday.

On Friday, the women opened the tournament with Concord and lost 3 games with scores of 7-15, 15-13 and 11-15. Nikki Hardman led the way with 12 kills and 4 blocks, while sophomore Tracey Fluharty added 6 kills. The Lady Pioneers then played Shepherd and lost in 3 games again. Scores are 17-15, 7-15 and 10-15. Hardman recorded 13 kills and 9 blocks and Fluharty came in with 9 kills. Setter Patsy Buckles added 13 assists. For their 3 matches on Friday, the squad lost to tournament champion WV Wesleyan with scores of 12-15 and 1-15.

The women played only

one match on Saturday and defeated Salem-Teikyo with scores of 15-6 and 15-8. Hardman had 14 kills and Buckles recorded 20 assists in the

Head Coach Kenny Osbourne reflected this about the season, "We had a cut of expectations, but came up short." Osbourne also said that injuries played a big part in the team's performance and looks to improve and be a better squad next year. 

Michael Barrett had a great fall winning four tournaments out of six. Carney said that they are getting prepared for the spring and hope to continue the great success that the team has made this year.


Skyball Tournament Held at To Your Health Fitness Club





Movie Review

Dracula Has Teeth

Vlad Tepes, a 15th-century monster, impaled his Turkish enemies on sharpened poles and feasted beneath their putrefying corpses. His cruelty became legend even as his countrymen praised his exploits against invaders. He was "Dracula"--Romanian for "son of the dragon," and Bram Stoker's "Dracula," a vast, illustrious retelling of the 1897 classic, is the first horror film to deal with Dracula as a murderer, a powerful epitome of lust and terror and evil, and not as a pallid corpse to cower beneath garlic and crosses. Do you think of Bela Lugosi when you think of Dracula, a pasty ghoul in black with vinyl wet hair? Think again.

In this film, perhaps the only Dracula movie ever to follow the novel in detail, Dracula renounces Christianity and becomes nosferatu, a vampire, after his beloved wife is tricked into suicide. Cut to 1897, when a young law clerk named Jonathan Harker (Keanu

Reeves) travels from London to Dracula's castle to complete a business transaction in which the monster, aged and starved for new blood, buys a new hunting ground in Britain. Harker leaves sanity behind, including his fiance (Winona Ryder) who is a picture of Victorian innocence and also happens to be a reincarnation of Dracula's spouse. After some highly erotic scenes involving Harker and three diabolical vampiresses, Dracula heads for London to wreak havoc on the populace, find his long dead love, and clash with Dr. Van Helsing, played with fiendish delight by Anthony Hopkins.

Director Francis Ford Coppola makes these vampires powerful, unafraid to walk in sunlight, incinerate crosses, and enjoy drinking blood in a Gothic extravaganza of operatic music, great performances, and gore. Dracula may be overtly familiar to horror fans, but it's played with new finesse in this stunning production. Bram Stoker's Dracula has teeth.
