## Dracula' Opens Tonight in Administration Building Theater

At 8:00 this evening the play "Dracula" will open in the theater of the Administration Building. The play, an adaptation of Bram Stoker's *Dracula* by Hamilton Deane and John L. Alderton, is under the direction of Mike McKibben, a senior at GSC. The play is being sponsored by Alpha Psi Omega and will run from Wednesday, December 2, to Friday, December 4, each evening at 8:00.

The cast, which includes some newcomers to the stage, will feature Dennis Wemm as Van Helsing, Keith Miller as Dr. Seward, David Miller as Dracula, Brad Workman as Jonathan Harker, Cathy Burgess as Rhinefield, Stephanie Adams as Lucy, David Rich as the butler and Lori Crouter as the maid. People behind the scenes aiding in the play's production are stage manager Edie Fleming and technical director Alan Bearfield.

The play will be relying on technical aspects such as trapdoors, flying bats and breaking mirrors and will include some props and costumes which were made from "scratch" such as Dracula's costume and coffin. McKibben commented, "A lot of Dracula's effect in this play is all nonverbal because he acts

normal. There's nothing unusual about him; he's a gentleman and that's why the vampire legend has lasted so long. People should come to see the play, not because of the stakes through the heart or bites on the neck but because it's an American classic."

For McKibben, who graduates in December, this will be his debut as a director but his final stage work at GSC. When asked what he thought about doing "Dracula," he said, "It's the one play I've wanted to do since I've been in theater, so it's kind of fitting I get to do it now. The actors did a hell of a job, and everyone is working hard to make this show work. I'm very proud of everyone."

Tickets for the play are \$1.00 for students and \$3.00 for the faculty, staff and general public.

## Hardman Assumes Post as GSC Business Manager

Bob Hardman is a part of Glenville, and that is something he does not intend to change. From his birth in Gilmer County in 1953 to his GSC graduation in 1975 to his position now as business manager of the college, he has been an integral part of the community and of his old alma mater for years.

Originally, Hardman, who played football and basketball as well as pursuing a degree in education at GSC, had set out to be a teacher, but "I saw a good opportunity and took a challenge and became an accountant comptroller for a local oil company." Now, he has swung full circle and come back to campus as business manager, "stretching a dollar bill to its fullest extent and being in charge of the 'big checkbook of the college.'" A typical day includes

parceling the campus budget for salaries, utilities, financial aid, repair and transportation.

Although he has been here for less time than many of GSC's students (about three weeks), Hardman says, "I am excited about working here and being part of the campus life. I like the interaction with people." Hardman says the adjective "friendly" suits GSC ideally. For now, he is getting a feel for his position and enjoying being back in his hometown.

Hardman resides on Mineral Road with his two children by a previous marriage, Robbie, 10, and Hillary, 8; his wife Gina; and two stepchildren, Sarah, 13, and Patrick, 10. The business position at GSC gave him an opportunity to stay in Glenville. Bob Hardman plans to take full advantage of that.

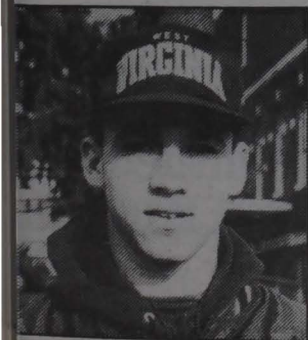
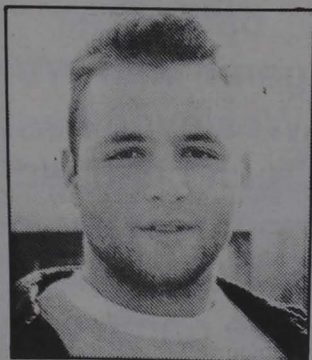

## Lady Pioneers 2-1 After First Three Games

The GSC women's basketball team opened the 1992-93 season by winning 2 of its first 3 games. The Lady Pioneers lost their season opener on November 20 to Gettysburg College, PA, 76-79 in the first round of the Frostburg Invitational at Frostburg, MD. The balanced scoring attack was led by Nikki Cale's score of 19, June Schriver score of 18, Christy Fitzwater added 13 and Jackie Myers scored 14 points and hauled in 9 rebounds.

On Saturday, November 21, the women came back and claimed the consolation game by beating Lycoming College 90-59 to even their record at 1-1. Myers led the way, scoring 16 points and adding 11 rebounds. Amy Scott scored 14 points, while Shriver scored 13 points and made 7 rebounds. For the game, 10 different players scored for the Lady Pioneers and 6 of them scored in double figures.

The home opener match for the women on Saturday was against Ohio Valley College. The Pioneers cruised easily to a 103-75 win. Cale was again the

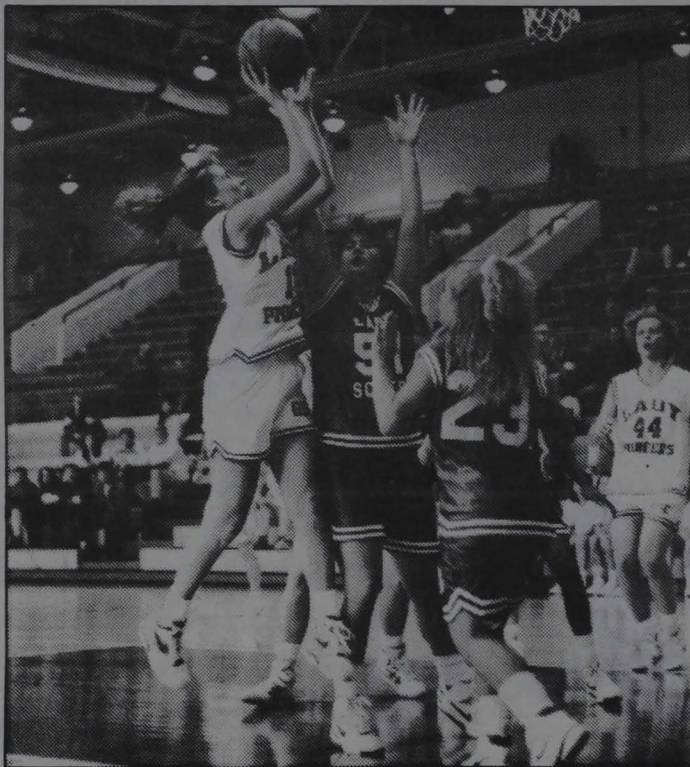

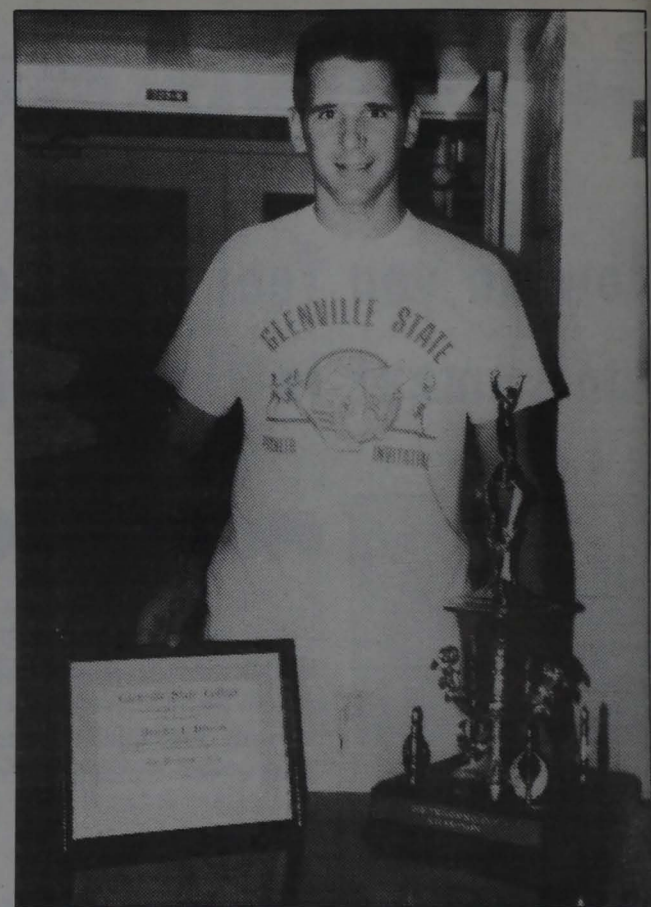

## Meet Tim Hixson, Winner of the 1991-92 President's Cup Challenge

Tim Hixson, a staff member in the Physical Education Building, originally from Mt. Pleasant, Pennsylvania, is last year's winner of the President's Cup Challenge. Hixson was presented with a trophy and certificate by President Simmons in May. By winning, Hixson became one of only five individuals in school history to ever win the President's Cup since the competition began in 1983. In order to win, Hixson had to meet certain standards in a minimum of twenty events, which included such activities as jogging, cycling, swimming and track and field events.

Hixson prepared for the President's Cup Challenge by combining a daily run with aerobic activities and his martial arts experience. When asked what he felt the benefits of taking part in the President's Cup Challenge were, Hixson

replied, "For me it was a self-achievement goal with the standards high, and my goal was to meet those standards." His goal of winning the President's Cup took a lot of hard work over two semesters to obtain, but Hixson added that "there are a lot of things in life that you must really have a will and drive to accomplish, and the President's Cup Challenge was one of these accomplishments for me."

Hixson is not competing in the President's Cup Challenge again this year, but he does plan to compete in another Intramural activity involving running the most miles in a semester.

When asked if he would recommend the President's Cup Challenge for anyone, he replied, "I would recommend it for anyone with high standards and wanting to meet a challenge."

*In My Opinion . . .*

To the Editor,

I doubt that anyone could disagree with the fact that these past few long days before Thanksgiving break are stressful for everyone on campus. Think about it. We have been at this since August. You remember: shorts, sunshine, new books. The newness of the semester is gone, the middle of the semester is gone, and now we are stuck between the end of football season and Christmas break. We have a right to be stressed.

Any idea of what stress can do to a person? Among other things, it can make you irritable, intolerant of others, give you a tendency to overreact and lower self control. You carry a higher amount of free flowing anxiety, which can bog your immunity system down, and if you are inclined to intoxication, your indulgence will increase.

Now, let's take these factors and add the fact that football season has just ended. Hmmm. I think that makes it shark season in Glenville. Grizzly bear Friday, stud sharks Saturday. I, too, was at the bar when the evening was ruined

Rossano says that the purpose of the concert is to "show many different styles of music."

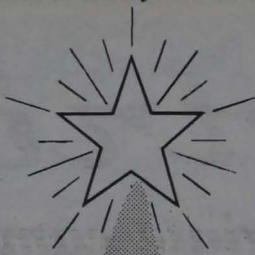
### Review

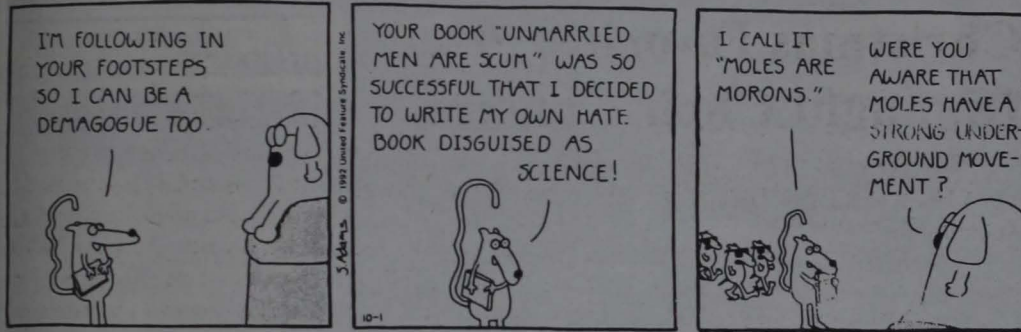

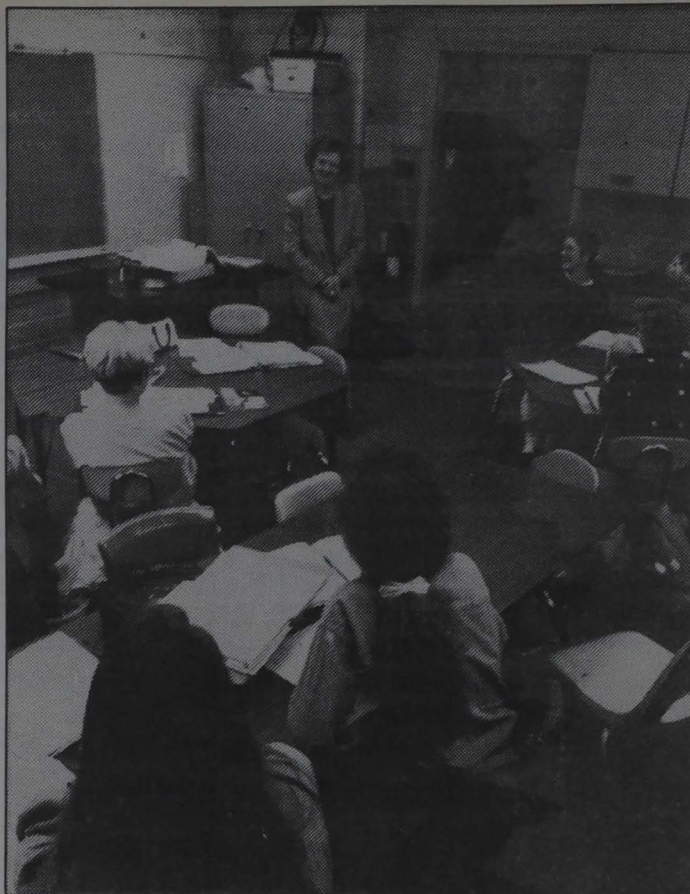

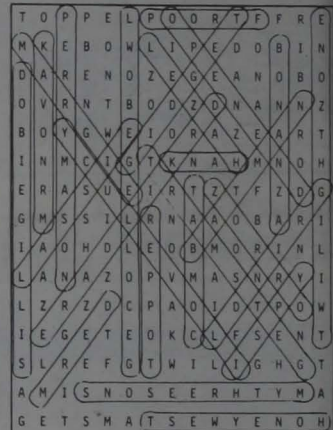
