The play is being ponsored by Alpha Psi Omega nd will run from Wednesday, et ther to the mall!

December 2, to Friday, December 4 , each evening at $8: 00$.

The cast, which includes some newcomers to the stage, will feature Dennis Wemm as Van Helsing, Keith Miller as Dr. Seward, David Miller as Dracula, Brad Workman as Jonathan Harker, Cathy Burgess as Rhinefield, Stephanie Adams as Lucy, David Rich as the butler and Lori Crouter as the maid. People behind the scenes aiding in the play's production are stage manager Edie Fleming and technical director Alan Bearfield.

The play will be relying ontechnical aspects such as trapdoors, flying bats and breaking mirrors and will include some props,and costumes which were made from "scratch" such as Dracula's costume and coffin. McKibben commented, "A lot of Dracula's effect in this play is all nonverbal because he acts
normal. There's nothing unusual about him; he's a gentleman and that's why the vampire legend has lasted so long. People should come to see the play, not because of the stakes through the heart or bites on the neck but because it's an American classic."

For McKibben, who graduates in December, this will be his debut as a director but his final stage work at GSC. When asked what he thought about doing "Dracula," he said, "It's the one play I've wanted to do since I've been in theater, so it's kind of fitting I get to do it now. The actors did a hell of a job, and everyone is working hard to make this show work. I'm very proud of everyone."

Tickets for the play are $\$ 1.00$ for students and $\$ 3.00$ for the faculty, staff and general public.


Hardman Assumes Post as GSC Business Manager

Bob Hardman is a part of Glenville, and that is something he does not intend to change. From his birth in Gilmer County in 1953 to his GSC graduation in 1975 to his position now as business manager of the college, he has been an integral part of the community and of his old alma mater for years.

Ilike the interaction with people." Hardman says the adjective "friendly" suits GSC ideally. For now, he is getting a feel for his postion and enjoying being back in his hometown.

Hardman resides on Mineral Road with his two children by a previous marriage, Robbie, 10 , and Hillary, 8 ; his wife Gina; and two stepchildren, Sarah, 13, and Patrick, 10. The business position at GSC gave him an opportunity to stay in Glevnille. Bob Hardman plans to take full advantage of that.

The GSC women's basketball team opened the 1992 93 season by winning 2 of its first 3 games. The Lady Pioneers lost their season opener on November 20 to Gettysburg College, PA, 76-79 in the first round of the Frostburg Invitational at Frostburg, MD. The balanced scoring attack was led by Nikki Cale's score of 19 , June Schiver score of 18 , Christy Fitzwater added 13 and Jackie Myers scored 14 points and hauled in 9 rebounds.

On Saturday, November 21 , the women came back and claimed the consolation game by beating Lycoming College 90-59 to even their record at 1 1. Myers led the way, scoring 16 points and adding 11 rebounds. Amy Scott scored 14 points, while Shriver scored 13 points and made 7 rebounds. For the game, 10 different players scored for the Lady Pioneers and 6 of them scored in double figures.

The home opener match for the women on Saturday was against Ohio Valley College. The Pioneers cruised easily to a 103-75 win. Cale was again the
