Input From 6,000 Citizens

HEAT Calls for Improvements in Higher Education Service

The report of the Higher Education Advocacy Team (HEAT) includes a number of specific recommendations for improving the service to West Virginia provided by higher education. The 17-member team developed the report over a sixmonth period based on a number of meetings, input from approximately 6,000 citizens at regional hearings held throughout West Virginia and testimony from two national higher education experts. As specified in the joint resolution adopted by the West Virginia Senate and House of Delegates in the 1992 regular legislative session, the HEAT report has been provided to Governor Gaston Caperton and the Legislature in preparation for the 1993 session.

The report concludes that 'additional state funds must be appropriated to state colleges and universities in West Virginia to attract and retain qualified staff and faculty members." To achieve this goal, the Advocacy Team recommended that the Legislature should appropriate additional state funds over the next three years to bring average salaries for faculty members and non-classified staff to the averages at similar institutions in the SREB region and for classified employees to the average for similar position in West Virginia and other appropriate employment markets.

Other recommendations in the report are designed to increase access to higher education for the citizens of West Virginia; assure that state colleges and universities are a accountable, efficient and productive as possible; and assure that the quality of education and work-force preparation meets the current and future needs of the State. For example, a number of specific recommendations are provided to increase access by reducing financial, geographical, attitudinal and academic barriers for the citizens of West Virginia. Many of these recommendations involve closer cooperation between public schools and institutions of higher education, expanded use of distance education technologies, and efforts to make institutions as "student friendly" as possible.

Recommendations related to accountability, efficiency, and productivity include eliminating degree programs that are not cost-effective, assessing student learning of the general education core curriculum, conducting follow-up studies of graduates and employers of graduates, depending more on postaudit financial accountability, providing state funds to each governing board in a single unclassified appropriation, charging out-of-state students the full cost of instruction, and setting minimum statewide standards for assessing and placing entering students in either collegelevel credit courses or non-credit developmental courses. The report also recommends that the average number of student credit hours taught by faculty members in West Virginia should be at least ten percent above the average for similar institutions in other states and the ratio of full-time state-funded non-instructional positions to FTE enrollment should be at least ten percent below the average ratio for similar institutions in other states.

The report also includes recommendations to improve the quality of education and work-force preparations, including stressing associate degree and "tech prep" programs, closer programs and internships for students in work settings, and mechanisms for feedback from employers to institutions of higher education concerning the skills and education needed by graduates. The report also recommends the need for careful studies of supply and demand for graduates of various degree programs in the work force and for institutions to adjust the number of graduates produced in relation to the number needed in the job market.

"We obviously do need to increase our salaries and give citizens access to higher education," says William Simmons, president of GSC. Simmons went on to say that the implementations in the report are reasonable and will need some financial support.

Simmons plans to work more on amplifying the message that students need to stay in school and be given the chance to graduate.

College Degree More Valuable, but **Graduates Are Less Prepared Reports Poll**

Seventy-two percent of West Virginia business people say a college education is more valuable today than it was a decade ago, according to the latest Key Centurion Business Poll.

Only 20 percent of respondents said a four-year degree is worth less in terms of career opportunities than it was 10 years

But, about 44 percent said today's college graduates are less prepared to enter the work force than they were a decade ago.

The Key Centurion Business Poll is conducted for Key Centurion Bancshares, The State Journal, WSAZ-TV and WTRF-TV by Ryan-McGinn-Samples Research Inc. Telephone interviews for this survey were complete during December 2 to 9 with 209 West Virginia business people.

Among other findings, the poll discovered that a majority

of West Virginia business people believe there currently is a greater need for employees with four-year degrees rather than workers with vocational training or high school educations.

Employees with a general four-year degree are needed more than those with more technical four-year degrees, respondents said.

In addition, four-year colleges are perceived as doing the best job of preparing their graduates for the work force in comparison to vocational schools, community or two-year colleges and high schools.

For this edition of The Key Centurion Poll, researchers are 95 percent certain that any aggregate percentage point won't be more than 6.8 percentage points--plus or minus--off the mark if each member of West Virginia's business community had been interviewed.

Only 27 percent of West Virginia business people rated high schools positively in terms of preparing students for the


About 50 percent of West Virginia businesses provide educational incentives and/or training programs for their employ-



Operation Native Talent Job Fair Set for February

Despite a still recovering economy, approximately 60 employers have registered to attend the second Operation Native Talent (ONT) job fair of the 1992-93 academic year. ONT is a job fair program designed to provide recruiters and employers with a cost effective way of meeting college seniors from almost all of West Virginia's colleges and universities.

The day-long job fair will be held Wednesday, February 3, 1993 at the Charleston Civic Center. Hours for the job fair are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m..

The fair is open to all West Virginia college seniors and recent graduates. Students are asked to "dress for success" and

bring plenty of resumes.

"The recruiters who attend the fair will have the opportunity to meet and interview more than 600 seniors from a variety of disciplines and degrees," said Robert Kent, chairperson of the ONT steering committee and Career Placement Director for West Virginia University.

College placement officers from all of the state's colleges and universities have been participating in the planning and promotion of the fair, Kent said. "The placement officers will publicize to their respective students the names of the employers who will be at the fair and the types of positions they will be seeking to fill."

Lady Pioneers Post 5-1 Record Since Break

The GSC Women's Basketball team has been active since Christmas as they have compiled a 11-6 overall mark.

On January 5, the women traveled to Parkersburg and coasted to a 71-41 win over Ohio Valley College. Nikki Cale led with 24 points and June Shriver added 12 points and 8 rebounds.

On January 7, they traveled to the University of Charleston and won on the road 80-74. Cale again scored 24 points, while Jackie Myers added 23 points and 12 rebounds, and Shriver added 19 points.

The women hosted Wheeling-Jesuit on January 9 and lost for the first time in the new year by a 97-102 count. Cale once again led the way as she poured in a game high 29 points.

The Lady Pioneers turned around on the road as they won their third consecutive road win over Concord with a score of 83-69 on January 11. Cale scored 25 points, as teammates Myers scored 23 points and hauled in 17 rebounds, and Christy Fitzwater recorded 18 points.

The women's team made it with 4 wins in 5 outings on January 13 as they beat Salem-Teikyo at the Pioneer Gym with a score of 84-69. Connecting on 6 of 11 three-points shots, Cale scorched the nets for 31 points, and Lori Slaughter tallied 15 points.

The Lady Pioneers were dealt a loss on January 14 by Fairmont State on a last-second three-pointer to lose 78-79 at the Pioneer Gym. Cale and Myers led the scoring with 28

and 17 points respectively. Slaughter turned in a fine all-round game scoring 13 points and grabbed 16 rebounds.

On January 18, the women hosted the University of Charleston and lost 62-83. The squad, plagued by the flu, struggled in their shooting, as they shot on 37 percent from the floor for the game. Cale scored 17 points and Shriver chipped in with 14 points.

On January 20, the squad traveled north and battled Salem-Teikyo coming up short by a 63-70 count. Poor shooting led to the loss as they only connected on 33 percent of their shots and still many players were hampered by the flu. Myers scored 17 points while Shiver scored 16 and pulled down 11 rebounds.

Pioneers Extend Winning Streak to Six

The GSC Men's Basketball team has compiled a 12-3 record and is off to their best start since 1972. In the process, they have won their last six games.

The men started the new year on January 6 at Salem-Teikyo and lost with a score of 67-71. The Pioneers were ahead by eleven points at half-time, but shot only 25 percent in the second half from the floor. Steve Shuffled the way with 18 points, and Joe Hampton added 16.

On January 9, the squad hosted top-rated Shepherd College and lost, 78-91. Shuff was again the high point scorer with 18, and Bruce Boldley scored 14.

The Pioneers traveled to West Liberty on January 11 and

won, 90-86. Hampton scored 23, and senior Dedsi Sanders chipped in with 21.

On January 13, the Pioneers hosted the Falcons of Fairmont State and cruised to a 69-43 win. Boldley led all scorers with 20 points.

The Pioneers were on the road on January 16 at Elkins to battle Davis & Elkins College. The Pioneers blew open a close contest in the second half as they won, going away with 90-64. Mike Fallon and Saunders each scored 15 leading the way as six pioneers scored in double figures.

On January 18, the men hosted Mercyhurst, Pa., and posted an 86-77 win. Boldley scored 18 as Shuff added 17 points.

January 20 found the men hosting the WV Tech Golden Bears coasting to a 92-64 win. Shuff led the Pioneers in scoring with 15.

The Pioneers made it six in a row by beating Alderson-Broaddus and escaped with a win of 62-61 win at Alderson-Broaddus last Saturday. Fallon led the Pioneers as he scored 12 points.

Head Coach Gary Nottingham is pleased with his team's playing and progress but feels they are capable of playing better. Student fan support was also a concern as he felt that students should offer more support to the players as they are currently rated number two in the WVIAC.





John Mark Walkup to Present Piano Recital Sunday

Anyone who has walked through the Fine Arts Building has likely heard the clamor of several instruments being practiced at once. Listen a while longer and you will notice the sounds being replaced by new ones as music majors leave for other classes and are replaced by others. After all the rooms are quiet, one sound remains — a piano. Night after night you can find John Walkup at his piano bench.

In addition to his responsibilities as a music teacher, Walkup makes it a rule to practice four to six hours every day. Why? Because on Sunday, January 31, at 3:00 p.m. he will give his first recital as a teacher at GSC. He will perform pieces by Mozart. Mendelssonn, Rachmaninoff and Ginastera.

He began planning the program in the spring of 1992. This recital is important to him because it is a step towards his goal of realizing his full musical potential. "Unfortunately, reaching that level is an ongoing process and you must have discipline," says Walkup. The recital is also important because it gives his students a chance to hear some of the things they are

asked to do. When asked if the added responsibilities of teaching make it more difficult to reach his goal as a musician, he said, "It is difficult while teaching but there is time. It takes discipline to find practice hours."

Performing at Glenville State is certainly nothing new for Walkup. He spent five years as a music major at GSC and gave many solo performances during that time. Returning to the stage as a teacher is different. "As a teacher it is different because you must tell yourself the things to do to deliver a good musical performance. It isn't more intimidating, but the desire to deliver a musical performance is certainly there."

After graduating from GSC Walkup taught for six months in public schools before accepting an assistantship at the University of Illinois where he received his master's in piano pedagogy. He is now in his second year of teaching at Glenville State College. Walkup, who is also an avid football fan, says not to worry about missing the Superbowl, for he will start playing at three and will finish by four.

Movie Review

A Few Good Men

The title says everything; with a cast that includes Tom Cruise, Jack Nicholson, Kiefer Sutherland and Kevin Bacon, "A Few Good Men" is one of the finest ensemble pieces on screen, fueled by more testosterone than a beer commercial. Throw in a tough-as-nails lieutenant (Demi Moore) and directions by "Misery's" Rob Reiner, and this ultimate courtroom drama is a likely Oscar contender

Code Red, a relatively harmless practice by Marines to

punish unit members who are less than adequate, turns into murder at a Cuban war base, and two young Marines are arrested. Their defense turns out to be a wisecracking Navy attorney (Tom Cruise), a year out of law school. He is prepared to plea bargain the Marines until a lawyer (Demi Moore), hungry for respect in a "man's world," convinces him the outlawed Code Red was ordered by superiors illegally. Their investigation eventually brings a gungho colonel (growling, grizzled Nicholson-superb) to the stand, a move that could have both attorneys court-marshalled while searching for the truth.

The tension betweer Cruise and Nicholson, between the old Guard and the new, is a convincing generation gap as these two stars go for each other's throats in a pretense of acting. They're enthralling in their roles as mutually despising military men, flip sides of the same coin (one of them could be thanking the Academy in a few weeks), and their skills save "A Few Good Men" from becoming too pretentious to be entertaining.




