Wasserstein's Pulitzer Prize Winning 'The Heidi Chronicles' Opens Tonight

"All people deserve the right to fulfill their potential" sets the tone of the play "The Heidi Chronicles" by Wendy Wasserstein which is to be presented on the February 24, 25 and 26 in the Fine Arts Audito-

Under the direction of Nancy Wemm, the play gives

the audience a glimpse into acter Heidi instantly came to history. The play chronicles the women's and gay lib movements and how they affected the people of the time.

The play also provides insight as to what made the Baby Boomers who they are today. Wemm commented that when she first saw Hillary Clinton on television, the charmind

Wemm said that "The Heidi Chronicles" is a very modern play, and staging it proved very difficult because it is written in a cinamatic style. The play travels to several different cities and covers the time from 1965 to present.

"The Heidi Chronicles," which won the 1989 Pulitzer Prize for drama, makes us look at ourselves in many different and amazing ways.

Celebrated Afro-Americans-Dizzy Gillespie

Jazz trumpeter John Birks "Dizzy" Gillespie was best known as the co-creator (with Charlie Parker) of be-bop.

Dizzy's balloon-like cheeks, wild, on-stage antics and famous up-turned horn (bent accidentally during horseplay at a nightclub) made him the most recognizable musician of the bebop era.

Gillespie was born in Cheraw, South Carolina, the youngest of James and Lottie Gillespie's nine children. He took up the trumpet in the third grade, and after the ninth grade he left his home town to attend

in North Carolina.

He dropped out his senior year in order to move to Philadelphia where he played onenight stands in jazz clubs.

Gillespie eventually landed a position in the Frankie Fairfax band where he picked up his nickname. He recounted the story in his 1979 autobiography, To Be or Not To Bop: "One day, I was playing the piano before rehearsal. When I got up from the piano, Fats Palmer looked across at my empty seat in the trumpet section and cracked a joke. 'Where's Dizzy, man?' Everybody started laughing. My name has been

Laurinburg Technical Institute Dizzy to everybody ever since; even my wife calls me that."

> When talking about bebop, the music that changed jazz forever, Gillespie commented: "I'm not surprised that [be-bop] is still flourishing, because it was bona fide music. Anything bona fide will stay around."

> Dizzy Gillespie himself had been around. He has received numerous awards, including the Kennedy Center Honor and the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award, and he has made over 500 recordings.

Although Dizzy Gillespie recently left us, his musical legacy will love in jazz forever.

Editorial -**Does History Repeat Itself?**

I remember in grade school asking my history teacher, "Why do we have to learn this? When will I ever need this knowledge?" You may never need to know U.S. or even world history, but through reading you can discover innumerable interesting facts about it.

The events related here occurred exactly 100 years apart.

Both President Lincoln and President Kennedy were concerned with civil rights issues. Lincoln was elected in 1860, Kennedy in 1960. Both were shot from behind in the head. Johnson was the name of their successors; both were southern democrats with seats in the senate. Andrew Johnson was born in 1808, Lyndon Johnson in 1908.

John Wilkes Booth, the man who shot and killed Lincoln, was born in 1839. Lee Harvey Oswald, the man who shot and killed Kennedy was born in 1939. Both Oswald and Booth were southerners who favored unpopular ideas. Both were assassinated before going to trial. After shooting Lincoln in a theater, Booth hid in a warehouse. Kennedy was shot from a warehouse, and Oswald hid in a theater.

While living in the White House, both President Lincoln and President Kennedy' lost children through death. Both presidents were killed in the presence of their wives on a Friday. President Lincoln's secretary, whose name was Kennedy, suggested that he not go to the theater, while President Kennedy's secretary, whose name was Lincoln, advised him not to go to

The names Lincoln and Kennedy each contain 7 letters. The names Andrew Johnson and Lyndon Johnson each contain 15 letters. The names John Wilkes Booth and Lee Harvey Oswald each contain 15 letters.

Over fort years ago, President Harry Truman took action to eliminate discriminatory policies. Clinton has staken a stand on gays in the military just as Harry Truman did for blacks in 1948. It has taken decades for Americans to become accustomed to Truman's decision as it probably will with Clinton's.

Other repeated events are biblical ones. The book of Exodus contains a story in which God's wrath was kindled against the people of Sodom and Gomorrah for their homosexuality. When they refused to turn away from their shin God destroyed the city. In Noah's time, God instructed Noah to build an ark for he would flood the face of the earth to rid it of evil people. In the book of Numbers, God destroyed the people under the leadership of Moses for the "bullheadedness" by allowing a pit to open in the earth and swallow the them.

While some may say these are coincidences, a closer look can lead us to many more parallels throughout history. It's well worth the time to find

Shuff led the attack with 18 points while Joe Hampton



Lauri Slaughter shoots for two at the Lady Pioneers' game against West Virginia Tech last Saturday.


Lady Pioneers at 20-8

The GSC women's basketball team continued its second half surge by beating WV Tech on Saturday and University of Charleston on Sunday.

Senior Nikki Cale led the way on Saturday by scoring 19 points, while center Jackie Myers turned in a fine all-round game by scoring 19 points, also pulling 13 rebounds to lead the Lady Pioneers to a 79-67 win over WV Tech in the first round of the WVIAC tourney. June Shriver scored 16, and Christy Fitzwater scored 10 points and dished out 12 assists.

The fourth seeded women's team took the floor on Sunday to battle U.C. led by an inspiring play by Myers, winning by a 69-59 score. Myers, who scored 19 points and accumulated 10 rebounds, was in foul trouble much of the game. Shriver also tallied 19 points for the cause as Fitzwater added 13.

The Lady Pioneers faced number one seed Bluefield State on Monday night at 7:00 p.m. At press time, the result of that game was not available. The women's record now stands at 20-8 overall.



Untamed Heart

Just in time for Valentine's Day comes a schamltzy romance wasting the talents of three up and comers (Christian Slater, Rosie Perez and Marisa Tomei) in the melodramatic blend of love and tears that has come to define "teen movie."

Poor old Caroline (Tomei) is one of life's kicked dogs; if it weren't for bad luck, as the cliche goes, she'd have to luck a'tall.

She gets used and abused by a lot of dirtballs in her search for Mr. Wonderful and is going pretty much nowhere in her career as a beautician/waitress at the local hamburger shop. Little does she know that Mr. Wonderful is lurking right under her nose; the dishwasher (Slater) may redefine the term "greasy spoon" but he looks pretty darn good when he saves her life from two would be rapists.

In one of the movies' more powerful moments, Caroline


passes out in Slater's arms, and he carries her back home in the night air.

Camelot: Filmed in 1967, this musical by the team of Lerner and Loewe received mixed reviews at best. Although the reviews were poor this is not a musical to pass. The sets used in the film are impressive, and the strong score should not be overlooked.

Grease: John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John starred in this 1978 film. The songs are clever, and the film has a wonderful way in conjuring up the 50's nostalgia. The most memorable songs from the musical are "Summer Nights," "Greased Lightning" and "Hopelessly Devoted to You."

Fiddler on the Roof: Israeli actor Topol, in the role of

Tevye, gave a powerful performance in the film that went on to win three Oscars. Some of the most popular stage songs came from this movie. Songs such as "If I Were a Rich Man" and "Sunrise, Sunset" will be known forever.

Although a great amount of controversy surrounds this film, it should not be overlooked simply for the fact of the blazing score written by Sir Andrew Loyd Webber and lyrics by Tim




