TKEs Help Direct Traffic School Children Visit GSC to see 'Arabian Nights' and Tour Campus

On April 28, 29 and 30, the GSC Children's Theater presented "Arabian Nights" to an audience of over 3700 school children from the surrounding area. The stories of "The Merchant and the Genie," "The Enchanted House" and "Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves" were told in language directed toward a fourth- and fifth-grade audience.

Children from 31 schools came in buses, vans and cars to visit the GSC campus. Normally, campus security would help with traffic control and parking, but since they were scheduled to be off campus last Wednesday and Thursday, the

TKEs volunteered to help. They donned fluorescent orange vests and served as directors of traffic and guides for campus tours. Bruce Hathaway, director of the physical plant, said that the TKEs "did an extremely fine iob."

Of the over 3700 children who came to see the play, almost 600 remained after the performance for campus tours. Their tour began at Pickins Hall, continued past the Wesley Foundation and Alumni House on the way to the Heflin Center with visits to the snakes in the Science Hall and pool and gym in the Physical Education Building. The tour continued with a visit to Clark Hall, Louis Bennett

Hall, the Administration Building and the first floor of the library. In addition to the TKEs, over 13 other GSC students served as tour guides.

Overall, the children seemed to enjoy their day. One group was even heard singing "Achy Breaky Heart" in unison as they waited in the morning air for the play to get underway.



Gang Summit

Gangs around the country are joining forces for a good cause: personal survival. On April 29 a California community group called Hands Across Watts is holding a day-long "Gangs United for Peace Town Hall Summit," at which leaders from the Crips, the Bloods and other gangs will talk about ways to end inner-city violence. Also starting on April 29, the Ohio-based Council for Urban Peace and Justice will held a four-day-long conference in Kansas City, Missouri, that is expected to draw more than 100 former and current gang members from 20 cities. The highlight of the two events will occur when gang leaders from both meetings are linked via satellite for a teleconference.--As reported in Time, May 3, 1993.

Before you leave campus for the summer, please be sure to do the following:

1. Complete the sign-out sheet when it is posted by your R.A.


2. Move all your belongings from your room, close and lock the windows, turn off the lights and lock the door.

3. Get an R.A. and have him/her check you out of your room with your room inventory card. You are responsible for all damages or missing articles until your room is checked. Your room must be left clean. (All trash, empty pop cans, etc., must by disposed of properly.) If your room is dirty, a \$5.00 cleaning fee will be withheld in addition to general damages from your \$50.00 deposit.

4. Sign out and turn in your key to the residence hall office. Otherwise the cost is \$15.00

5. The residence hall closes promptly at 5:00 p.m. so your packing should be done in advance. Those who are not participating in commencement or attending commencement will check out of the residence hall as soon as possible following their last final exam.

Those staying for commencement should notify the resident assistant.





Golfers Win WVIAC Tournament


GSC golfers capped a great spring season by winning the WVIAC Conference Championship on Tuesday, April 27. The tournament, held at Cacapon State Park, was scheduled for Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, but the Monday session was cancelled due to rain.

GSC beat second-place finisher Fairmont State by 20 strokes. The Pioneers will now be the WVIAC representative at the NAIA national championships to be held at Jacksonville, Fla. from June 2 to 5.

The Pioneers were led by Patrick Geraghty, who was named WVIAC player of the year and shot a 75-69--144 and also received medalists honor while GSC's Michael Barrett claimed second medalist by shooting 75-75--150.

The squad made the allconference list as they placed third on the team. Geraghty and Barrett were named to the squad along with Vance Fitzsimmons, who shot a 79-79--158. Just off the pace were Colin Cassidy, who shot a 78-82--160 and Stephen Maloney 82-79--161.







Groundhog Day

Bill Murray, who's made a career of comedies from clinkers (like "Scrooged") to classics (like "Ghostbusters"), is a long way from the ideal image of "movie star." He's balding, out of shape, pock marked and annoying in all his movies. Playing the straight man to low comedy has typecasted him, but at least he relishes playing the urban jerk.

In "Groundhog Day," Murray is Phil, the weatherman, sent by his TV network to report on the February 2 woodchuck reawakening of Puxsutawney Phil, a Pennsylvania groundhog who supposedly decides the fate of the next six weeks by seeing his shadow.

Puxsutawney, which is roughly the size of Glenville, has made history by turning Groundhog Day into a circus, and Phil, enlivened by Murray's sarcasm, arrives in town at the onset of a blizzard with his gorgeous producer Rita (Andie MacDowell) and his cameraman (Chris Eliot) to record the celebration.

Phil stays in a quaint little bed and break fast ("Do you have espresso?" he asks the landlady,

and then makes fun of her because she doesn't even know how to spell it.) and awakens to find February 2 replaying itself over and over again.

"Groundhog Day" is the sort of parable that makes "It's a Wonderful Life" such a great film because it asks the question, "If you had only one day to live, what would you do?"

The movie is sort of a "Twilight Zone" episode; the viewer begins to feel some of Murray's despair as he tries to figure out what's going on and how he can get out of his permanent nightmare, which keeps bringing him back to February 2.
